"The county of Bernalillo paid the largest amount of territorial taxes collected during the month of December last, amounting to \$20,523. Justo R. Armijo being the collector. Next comes Colfax county, George J. Pace collector, \$8,289. Third comes Valencia county, Solomon Luna collector, with \$8,116."

Col. Frost usually treats Chaves county with proper consideration, but he overlooked a bet this time. As a matter of fact Chaves county, with J. Smith Lea as collector, should have stood second in the list, this county having paid taxes collected during December to the amount of \$17,738.27, as follows: for 1902, \$7.94; for 1903, \$51.48; for 1904, \$162.34; for 1905, \$17,516.51.

Chaves paid more than twice as much as Colfax, which was given second place.
