Like President Roosevelt, the governor of New Mexico has the members of his own party against him and the Democrats for him on all reforms that would be really beneficial to the people.

Indirectly, Governor Hagerman recommends that Col. Max Frost, of the Santa Fe New Mexican be abolished. In other words, the Governor would cut off the Territorial printing graft and abolish the Immigration Bureau.

Governor Hagerman does not believe that the Territorial educational institutions should be compelled to take in washing for support. Neither should they waste time in preparatory work that should be finished in the district schools.

Governor Hagerman may have had in mind the valuable work of the Roswell Commercial Club when he suggested that in progressive towns local organizations were doing more effective work in attracting immigration than the Bureau of which the last year's Almanac is the official organ.

Part of the Roswell fight against county division is in the interest of Hagerman. There is a very warm feeling here for the people of Hagerman. We realize that Hagerman one day will become the most prosperous community in Chaves county outside of Roswell, and do not wish to see her made a sideshow to the circus of Artesia real estate men.

Senator Blackburn, of Kentucky, says: "The South will have to face an investigation of the race question at some time in the not distant future. We would just as soon have it forced by Republicans, who were trying to impeach their President because the Democrats are sustaining him in his constitutional right as for any other reason."

A dispatch from the Record's special correspondent at Santa Fe, received too late for publication yesterday, states that members of the legislature and leading citizens from all parts of the Territory who heard the Governor's message read expressive opinion that Mr. Hagerman has greatly strengthened himself by the presentation of an able state document. The message contains many recommendations of the greatest interest to all the people, and is well worth careful reading.

"The great test is coming. Can the Republican party reform itself? If Governor Hagerman can have his way, he may be able to establish many reforms in the Territory, but he has two months of strenuous life before him if he even attempts anything that looks like reform. He will have the Democrats with him in all things for the benefit of the people, but in the opinion of the Advertiser he will have great difficulty in getting any respectable number of his own party to rally to his support. The Democrats are always for reform, and will be there all the time.—Albuquerque Advertiser.

FOR THOSE WHO RUN.

The message of Governor Hagerman makes the following recommendations: better assessment laws providing for more equal taxation; reduction of county salaries; consolidation of public institutions; opposes a constitutional convention at the expense of the Territory; favors abolishing the office of Territorial printer, and abolishment of the "Bureau of Immigration; favors the passage of laws regulating the shipping of live stock by railroads; recommends increase of salaries for mounted police; asks that the election laws be revised; recommends a law prohibiting gambling, and the limitation of the retail liquor traffic by high license; suggests the need of better divorce laws and the codification and annotation of all Territorial statutes. These and other matters are discussed in detail. Better stop and read it all.

COUNTY DIVISION AND NEW BRIDGES.

From Carlsbad Argus. In the last issue of the Artesia Advocate its editor attempts to show the Argus and the Lakewood Progress the grievous injustice these two papers are doing the ambitious town which wants, without regard to the wishes of the balance of the county, a new bridge, county division, the seat of government for said new county—in short, wants to gobble everything in sight and some that are not; and also wants the people of the whole county to help pay for its ambitious longings. Vain hope; the people of Eddy county will never gratify that desire. In due time, the new bridge will be given the north end of the county; as also will be the one needed in the south end, but not until after the county commissioners have investigated the matter and located the spot for building. It may be barely possible that the bridge in the north end of the county will not be as near Artesia as the real estate boomers and politicians of that little town would desire; some of the other towns may have something to say.

Along this line it may be said that every town between Carlsbad and Hagerman has been promised a new bridge by the new county boomers, if they would support the new county scheme with Artesia as the county seat; and also be it said, to the credit of these other towns, that the said promise was laughed at.

You will get your bridge in the north end of the county, but the division of Eddy county will not go along with it.
