**NO OBSERVANCE OF DECORATION DAY HERE.**

After interviewing leaders among the United Confederate Veterans and local members of the Grand Army of the Republic, the Record has been unable to hear of any celebration or observance of any kind in Roswell for Decoration Day, which comes on Monday, May 30. It seems that there has been no leader to make a start in such a movement and the usual observance, in which both North and South have taken part, jointly, will go by default. The local organization of the G. A. R. has practically been disbanded, as it has not been a working force for some time. Capt. Alston of the U. C. V., is out of the city. So far as can be learned, there is to be no observance of Memorial Day in the churches tomorrow, either. The banks, post office and land office will be closed Monday, however, on account of it being a legal holiday.

Carrizozo, May 27.—It is announced that June 3rd has been finally set for the hearing of the injunction case in the Lincoln county seat controversy between Carrizozo and Lincoln. Judge John Y. Hewitt represents Carrizozo while Hon. T. B. Catron is looking after the interests of the old county seat.

**JURY SECURED AND MUSGRAVE TRIAL BEGINS.**

The jury for the district court trial of George Musgrave was secured at noon today and the trial was started this afternoon with the opening statement of attorneys. On the jury are B. B. Dietrich, Charles Shepherd, J. W. Talley, J. S. Kennedy, E. S. Mundy, J. Q. Cummins, L. B. Craig, J. H. Hall, W. L. Heltman, C. W. Whitman, Ernest Burns and E. B. Evans.  
 In the district court this morning L. F. Sutton, of the plains east of Hagerman, pleaded guilty to giving liquor to a minor and was fined \$50 and costs, with fine suspended. He paid the costs of \$65.20.

**WOOL IS NOW COMING IN FOR ROSWELL STORAGE.**

A. D. Garrett has finished shearing and brought in his clip, amounting to about 100,000 pounds. Martin Chavez has brought in his clip about 20,000 pounds. Bob Corn og Eder Valley, today brought in his clip about 12,000. Miller Brothers have sheared 2,000 sheep and have brought in their clip about 15,000 pounds. The Panasco Sheep Company (Elza White and others) will start shearing 20,000 saeep Monday. Their clip will amount to about 200,000 pounds. All the clips that have been brought in have been stored at the Roswell Wool & Hide Company and the Roswell Trading Company's ware houses.

**Schuetzens in Hoboken.**

New York, May 28.—Thousands of German-Americans are gathering in Hoboken today for the big Schuetzenfest to be held during all of next week under the auspices of the National Schuetzen Band. Fully 15,000 men are expected to be on hand to march in the big parade Monday, despite the protests of Hoboken civil war veterans, who allege that a pageant such as proposed is a desecration of Memorial Day. President Taft, if able to leave Washington, will probably address the shooters next Thursday. Addressing the committee, the President said:  
 "I know that sharpshooting is greatly encouraged in Germany, and I know that in Switzerland even more the associations of this kind really make up an army of some 200,000 men that could be summoned at once for the defense of that country. Their

constitution, as I recollect it, forbids a standing army, yet they are able to bring under the colors almost more quickly than we could in this great country some 200,000 able bodied, well trained marksmen.

"Now, of course, I want to encourage such associations as yours. I am anxious to encourage the practice of marksmanship throughout the country and I shall be very glad to come."

Veterans of the Civil War living in Hoboken became indignant when they learned of the proposed parade. A delegation called on Mayor Gonzales and told him that Decoration Day was consecrated to the fallen heroes of the Civil War and that a parade of shooters would be inappropriate, to say the least. The Mayor said he couldn't do anything in the matter, and the delegation left.

**Georgetown Commencement.**

Washington, May 28.—Commencement week at Georgetown University this year will be the largest the university has ever celebrated. The class presidents have arranged a program that will draw large numbers of old students to the city.

The baccalaureate sermon tomorrow will be the first event of the week. Exercises of the different schools will occupy the mornings, baseball games and crew races the afternoons. Evenings will be given to social events.

There will be a senior program on Monday, followed by outdoor productions by the dramatic and musical clubs, a society circus, the alumni banquet, and a vaudeville evening on Friday.
