HIGH RATE ENJOINED

St. Louis, Mo., June 1.—The restraining order granted last night at Hannibal by Judge Dyer, of the U. S. District court, against twenty-five western railroads to prevent them from advancing freight rates was certified to the United States circuit court here today.

The railroad officials generally refused to be quoted today concerning the suit. The action of the government, however, was a surprise to them.

Processes against the defendants were prepared and will be served in districts where the railroads have general offices. Under the orders of Attorney General Wickersham expediting certificates, providing for a speedy determination of the issues, was filed and copies mailed this morning to circuit judges Hook, Sanborn, Vandeventer and Adams.

Reed's Record Was Left Out.

By an oversight, the record of Reed, the catcher for Lake Arthur, was left out of the tabulated score of Monday's base ball game. He made a splendid record, as follows: At bat five times, two runs, two hits, eight putouts, one assist and no errors. Another mistake in the scoring gave to Stains a put-out and an assist that belonged to Leland. This was the sensational one-hand catch of Leland's in the fourth inning that saved two runs. Caldwell had three put-outs that were not registered in the tabulated score, also. It seems that it was an off-day for the score keeper, as well as for the team. Wright's great one-hand catch at third base, in which he tagged a runner without a lost motion of the hand, was a feature of the game, also, that deserved mention, although the umpire could not see that the runner was out.

GOVERNOR REYNOLDS DECORATES SOLDIERS GRAVES

Charles A. Reynolds a former Governor in the Philippines who is now located at Santa Fe as special agent for the General Land Office of the U. S. Government is here on official business, as an aide-de-camp under General E. J. Gihon, Commander in Chief Spanish War Veterans, Governor Reynolds is sworn to aid in the observance of Decoration Day, and this morning decorated every soldiers grave at South Side Cemetery, finding forty-eight graves of soldiers of north and south and of the Spanish war. Upon each grave he placed a United States flag. Governor Reynolds performed this office only after hearing that Decoration Day was not observed here yesterday, and to obey the spirit of the oath as aide-de-camp to General Gihon. It is the intention of the United Spanish War Veterans to carry forward the spirit of Decoration Day and honor the memory of all soldiers of the wars of the United States, and to embrace in this general sentiment the soldiers of all sections of the country. THE NEW FRENCH PARLIAMENT MEETS TODAY.

Paris June 1.—The new Parliament of France, elected on Sunday, April 24, assembled today for its first session. It is a noteworthy body, in that its 597 Deputies and the 306 members of the Senate together form the largest Parliament of recent times. The "Constituante" of 1789, the father of the present Chamber, had 1,145 members, while under the Directoire the electors named 750 representatives who were then for the first time divided into two houses.

The Republic of 1848, which established universal suffrage, brought out a constituent Assembly of 900 members, which was quickly reduced to 750 in its successor. This total was fixed by the Government of National Defense in September, 1870, and it was these 750 Deputies who signed the peace and endowed France with the Constitution under which she now lives.
