A thousand dollars worth of food had been stored the day of the fire in the building cornering on the barn. This is one more case that helps confirm the belief of the city firemen that there is a "fire bug" in Roswell.


### CENSUS ENUMERATION TIME EXTENDED HERE.

complete their work to date and these twenty-two are expected to finish up this week. Of these four districts are yet to be heard from in Chaves county, one in Curry county, three in Eddy county, one in Lincoln and two in Roosevelt.
