## OFFICIAL COPY OF THE COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

(Condensed Report)

Roswell, N. M., June 23, 1910.

Council convened pursuant to call of Mayor. Members Peppers Pearce, Davis and Whiteman, absent. Mayor presiding.

Report of Police committee read, adopted and filed.

Mr. Mullis introduced Ordinance No. 218, the same being an ordinance amending Ordinance No. 26 of the Compiled Ordinances. Read first time in full and referred to the Finance Committee.

Mr. Haymaker introduced Resolution No. 115 approving the tax levy for school purposes as made by the Board of Education. Unanimously adopted.

Communication from Eureka Hose Co. making special price on Fire hose read and by unanimous vote was not accepted.

Building permit granted R. P. Bean.

Mr. Reid introduced Ordinance No. 219 the same being an Ordinance providing for the sprinkling of streets. Read in full the first time and referred to the Streets and Alleys Committee.

Recess subject to call.

Roswell, N. M., June 28, 1910. Council convened pursuant to call of Mayor. Members Pearce and Wylis, absent. Mayor presiding.

Resignation of Frank H. Pearce presented, read and by unanimous vote accepted.

Mayor appointed Mr. J. S. Anderson as Councilman for the Third Ward to serve until the next General election.

Mr. Reid moved that Mr. Anderson be elected by the Council as Councilman for the Third ward for the term as appointed. Seconded by Mr. Cottingham and on secret ballot was unanimously elected.

Mr. Anderson qualified and sworn as Councilman.

Report of the Finance Committee in re Occupation ordinance read adopted and filed.

Report of the Streets and Alleys Committee in re the Sprinkling ordinance read, adopted and filed.

Mr. Mullis introduced Resolution No. 120 giving the Mayor power to appoint special policemen when occasion demands. Unanimously adopted.

Mr. Bryant introduced Ordinance No. 220 being an ordinance regulating Sanitary conditions of the City of Roswell. Read in full the First time and under suspension of rules was read second and third times by number and title and ordered published.

Mr. Reid introduced Resolution No. 121 suspending the work of the City Veterinarian, until final action on the Sanitary Ordinance. Unanimously adopted.

Ordinance No. 218 read second time in full and re-referred to Finance committee.

Ordinance No. 219 read second time in full and on motion duly carried was ordered published. Mr. Whiteman voting "no."

Members Haymaker and Cottingham appointed special committee to see about opening Fifth Street.

City attorney instructed to delay action in suit vs. the Ditch Co. pending agreement with the Ditch Co.

Council voted unanimously to immediately enforce the ordinances relative to building sidewalks.

Permission granted J. A. Manning to close opening between the Hotel and the Singer office building.

Adjourned.
