## PRAIRIE HOLOCAUST.

**TWELVE PEOPLE PERISH IN A PRAIRIE FIRE.**

**Roaring Flames in the Western Portion of the Strip—A List of the Victims Who Perished.**

More minute particulars of the prairie fire which swept over the western portion of the strip Wednesday were received yesterday. The fire swept over a broad stretch of land and several scores of settlers lost their wagons, tents, horses, and a number of their lives. J. T. Thomas and John Baker are reported to have been caught in the devouring flames and burned to death, together with two children of Mr. Thomas. Mrs. William Harrison and two children are missing and it is feared they were burned. A woman named Thompson and three children perished in the flames and Mrs. W. A. Kennedy and two children were burned, perhaps fatally. Others whose names cannot be ascertained were also burned. It is said most of the men were absent at the different land offices to file their claims, and the children and women folks struggled against the raging flames, alone.
