## DEMOCRATS QUIT.

THEY LAY DOWN ON THE SILVER STRUGGLE.

FIGHT ON REPEAL IS DROPPED.

Senator Harris So Informs the Free Coinage Republicans on Behalf of His Party Colleagues—Senator Dubala Says Silver's Dig Is Up—Clairure to the Front Again—Washington News.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—At 12:30 o'clock yesterday Senator Harris, acting for the silver Democrats, informed the silver Republicans that the Democrats had concluded that, after taking all the circumstances into consideration, their best course was to drop the fight against the repeal bill and allow it to come to a vote.

Senators Cockrell, Vest, Harris and Walthall were among those present at the conference which resulted in the Harris announcement. Senator Dubala of Idaho, speaking for the Western Silver men, at 1 o'clock yesterday, said: "Our jig is up. The Southern silver men have left us. There will be some discussion on the amendments of course, and debate may be protracted for a week or more, but we are beaten. We give up the fight."

TEXT OF THE REPEAL BILL.  
Following is the full text of the Voorhees bill, which will be substituted in the senate for the house bill:

That so much of the act approved July 11, 1890, entitled "An act to regulate the purchase of silver bullion and issue of treasury notes thereon, and for other purposes," as directs the secretary of the treasury to purchase from time to time silver bullion to the aggregate amount of 4,000,000 ounces, or so much thereof as may be offered in each month at the market price thereof, not exceeding \$1 for 36 2/3 grains of pure silver, and to issue in payment for such purchases treasury notes of the denomination of \$100, and the same is hereby repealed, and it is hereby declared to be the policy of the United States to continue the use of both gold and silver as standard money and to coin both gold and silver into money of equal intrinsic exchangeable value, such equality to be secured through international agreement or by such safeguards of legislation as will insure the maintenance of the parity in value of the coins of the two metals and the equal power of every dollar in the markets and in the payments of debts. And it is hereby further declared that the efforts of the government should be steadily directed to the establishment of such a safe system of bimetalism as will maintain at all times the equal power of every dollar coined or issued by the United States in the markets and in the payments of debts.

**STILL STEWARD AND JONES.**  
The Nevada Senators Taking Turns in Monopolizing the Senate's Time.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—While the recess of the senate expired at 10:30 yesterday it was fifteen minutes later before any business was transacted, as the last senator necessary to make a quorum did not appear until 10:45.

After some routine business Mr. Stewart of Nevada, resumed his speech against the repeal bill. He said that he had found that where the slavery agitation was most violent the human intellect was most active, and that in Kansas and Missouri there was a much higher average of intelligence and a broader grasp of public questions than in any other part of the country. With this preface, he read a letter from a gentleman in Missouri sustaining his side of the silver question.

The absence of a quorum was suggested by Mr. Power. A roll call developed a quorum and Mr. Kyle of South Dakota then moved that when the senate adjourn it be to meet at 12 o'clock to-morrow. This was defeated 4 to 41.

Mr. Stewart then resumed his speech and at 1:30, without concluding his speech, yielded the floor and Mr. Jones of Nevada resumed his argument against the bill.

Without finishing senate adjourned.

**Married on the Ferris Wheel.**  
WORLD'S FAIR GROUND, Oct. 25.—James D. Hutchinson and Miss Lottie Zickler came in from Waukegan, Ill., today, secured a marriage license and took passage on the Ferris wheel. When at the top the wheel was stopped just before 1 o'clock and the couple married 250 feet high in the air. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. E. E. Hartman of Waukegan.

**Another Wreck.**  
EFFINGHAM, Ill., Oct. 25.—The outbound passenger train on the Indiana & Illinois Southern railroad was wrecked at 6 o'clock near here. The rear coach went down an embankment, turning over twice with thirteen passengers in it. Benjamin J. Jones of this county, was fatally injured, while all the other occupants of the car were more or less seriously hurt.

**Montana's Last Bandit Dose for.**  
KALISPEL, Mont., Oct. 25.—Jack White, alias Ben Hall, the last of the gang that held up and robbed the Northern Pacific express at Gray Cliff last August, lies dead at the morgue at this place, having been shot yesterday afternoon about thirty miles east of here while resisting arrest.

**Appointed by President Jackson.**  
CHARLESTON, W. Va., Oct. 25.—J. H. Miller, undoubtedly the oldest postmaster in the United States, died at Gauley Sunday night. He was 88 years old and was appointed in 1847 by President Jackson. He has been postmaster at Gauley continuously since.

**Professional President of Brazil.**  
MONTEVIDEO, Oct. 25.—Frederico Calmones Lorenso has been proclaimed professional president of Brazil by Admiral Nello in command of the insurgent fleet. Lorenso is the captain of one of the rebel warships.

**A Society Founder Dead.**  
LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 25.—James Andrew Demaree, founder and general reporter of the order of the Knights of Honor, died at his home in this city this morning of hemorrhage of the stomach.

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## THE LAW AGAINST STRIKERS.

Kansas and Texas Company Seizes Injunction—Loomis Miners Arrested.

MACON, Mo., Oct. 25.—At Kirksville last night Judge Ellison of the circuit court in chambers granted a temporary injunction restraining six or five men, including the miners' committee, the leaders of the strike, the city marshal of Bevier, who is a deputy sheriff of Macon county, President Walters of Kansas of the miners' union, and the agents and attorneys of the strikers from entering upon the property of the Kansas and Texas Coal company at Bevier and Ardmore. The coal company charged that the coal miners had conspired and intimidated other men who wanted to work for the company and that their property is in danger of destruction or damage.

The United States marshal of St. Louis, was in Bevier this morning and arrested fourteen of the leaders of the strike there, the Loomis coal company being in the hands of United States Receiver Bayliff of Kansas City. The charges against the miners is trespass or intimidation.

**CLAIMED BY TWO PERSONS.**

One of the Battle Creek Disaster Bodies in Detroit.

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Oct. 25.—Dr. Sweetland of Edwardsburg, Mich., editor of the Argus, identified the body of one of the victims of the wreck here last Friday as that of his sister, Mrs. Evelyn Aldrich of Edwardsburg, and the body was shipped to that place last night. To-day the coroner received a dispatch from J. D. Wood of Cato, N. Y., stating that the body was that of his wife, which was identified by both men by her clothing. Mr. Wood asserts that he has positive proof that the body is that of his wife and Dr. Sweetland is just as positive that it is his sister. Coroner Gilbert has telegraphed the circumstances to Dr. Sweetland and Deputy Sheriff King has been sent to bring back the remains. It is feared that legal proceedings will have to be instituted before the body can be recovered.

**WOMEN MAY NOT VOTE.**

The Michigan Supreme Court Overturns the Women Suffrage Law.

LANSING, Mich., Oct. 25.—The act of the last legislature permitting women to vote at the municipal elections was declared unconstitutional by the supreme court.

**Prison Men Also Unhappy.**

MONTEVIDEO, Oct. 25.—A meeting of employees of the St. Louis and San Francisco road was held here last night with fully 500 present. Resolutions were adopted demanding that the two months' payment that were due them be paid not later than November 15. Committees were appointed to present the resolutions to the management and arrange for a full representative meeting of employees of the system at Montevideo next Monday.

**Banker Clinkscale at Rest.**

CARDIFF, Mo., Oct. 25.—J. R. Clinkscale, aged 45, president of the First National bank and prominent in Church circles, died at Excelsior Springs, at 5 o'clock this morning, of nervous prostration.

**Slain for His Money.**

OKLAHOMA, Oct. 25.—The dead body of L. D. Dowell of Peoria, Okla., was found near the oil plant south of here this morning. He was evidently killed for his money.

**Destructive Fire at Brenton, Mo.**

BENTON, Mo., Oct. 25.—Fire yesterday morning in the business portion of this place caused a loss of \$65,000. One man received injuries from which he died.

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
