COURT CLOSSES.

A SESSION UNPARALLELED FOR BUSINESS.

FOUR PRISONERS GET SENTENCES.

Squire DeVore, George Day, and Louis LeRoy Each Get Stretches in the Pen—District Court Adjourns at 12 O'Clock Last Night—Proceedings.

District court adjourned at 12 o'clock last night, after a session unparalleled and unequalled as to length and huge mass of business transacted. Judge Green disposed of considerable business before he doffed the judicial ermine, and when Judge Dale was inducted into office, the wheels of justice in the district court fairly rattled, so rapidly did they cover legal ground.

During the six weeks that Judge Dale was on the bench he disposed of 200 civil cases, 12 territorial cases, 41 United States criminal cases and two habeas corpus cases. This is a record of which any man may well feel proud. Judge Dale, when he ascended the bench, set a pace that even surprised litigants in court. The attorneys were amazed. Such rapidity, at the same time such fairness and justice on the part of the court, fairly dazed them. It was all strange to them, but they soon caught on that the bench was not given to dragging and dilly-dallying, and they got a move on themselves. In a few days the lawyers, on becoming accustomed to the change, liked it, and when a case was called were promptly on hand. The judge was, and is yet, complimented for the mass of ground covered and the clearance of many stubbornly-contested cases. The grand jury was discharged last night. Judge Dale will go to Stillwater this week to open court. Following are the cases disposed of yesterday:

World's Fair Receipts. CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—Treasurer Seeberger's report up to November 9 shows the receipts were \$3,401,903.37, and total disbursements \$1,031,532.49. The cash on hand is \$7,233,128.73, in which amount is included \$214,871.50 of souvenir coins. The chief sources of revenue were as follows: Gate receipts, \$10,576,298; from concessions, \$3,965,643; from stock, \$5,737,972; from souvenir coins, \$319,705 and miscellaneous, \$1,704,239.
