Commissioners for Q county—Messrs. T. A. Emery, T. A. Emmons and T. A. Henry. The "T. A.'s" are steady in their ways.

P. A. Booker was made surveyor of Q county. C. C. Hombrey was appointed superintendent of instruction for M county, and Leo P. Mosler justice of the peace for the same county.

R. H. Hager was selected as a county commissioner for Pottawatomie county.

DUBLIN, Dec. 5.—Sheridan, the man who was arrested at the time of the murder of Patrick Reed, who is supposed to have been connected with the plot to cause an explosion near Aldborough Barracks, was remanded on a charge of being in the unlawful possession of explosives.

A Mayor Murdered. MEMPHIS, Tenn., Dec. 5.—E. C. Williamson, mayor of Hazelhurst, Miss., was brutally murdered by Kirby Miller at 12 o'clock yesterday.

United States Judge Indicted. MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 5.—United States Circuit Judge James G. Jenkins, one of the indicted directors of the Plankinton bank, submitted an affidavit to the circuit court to-day, in which he requests a separate and speedy trial upon the merits of the case.

Governor Francis' Brother Dead. ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 5.—Sydney R. Francis, 36 years old, who was during the term of Governor D. R. Francis, his brother, managing head of the grain firm of D. R. Francis & Bros., died here yesterday morning of pneumonia after a brief illness.
