## BEALL MURDER CASE

WILL NOT COME UP FOR HEARING FOR SOME TIME.

### SOME NICE LEGAL POINTS INVOLVED.

Judge Scott Rules in an Application for a Change of Venue in the Case—Decision for a Change of Venue Must Come Before the Supreme Court.

County Attorney Huston was in Oklahoma City yesterday on business connected with the case of Lawyer F. M. Beall, charged with the murder of F. K. McKennon, in front of Lillie's drug store last spring. He appeared in Judge Scott's court and asked to have a hearing in regard to the change of venue in the case.

Judge Scott accommodated him to a degree, and ruled that he would do nothing with the case at present as the decision of the motion for a change of venue involved legal points that should come before the territorial supreme court.

The high tribunal sits during the next month, January, and at that time it is likely that the august body will assign for trial all the cases in which Judge Scott had formerly been an attorney, to some other judge for trial. Like the famous Terrill case, the Beall case will probably drag. Beall is now a prominent land lawyer at Oklahoma City, being interested with his father in a firm which is enjoying a large and lucrative business. Apropos this case, the Oklahoma City Press-Gazette said yesterday: "County Attorney Huston and Sheriff Painter had their nerve with them when they made affidavits to the effect that the territory of Oklahoma could not get a fair hearing in the Fred Beall case in Oklahoma county. They alleged further that Judge Scott is prejudiced by reason of having been an attorney for Beall before his appointment. Neither of the parties had an opportunity to test the feeling or sentiment of the people of this county on this or any other case, and they display their gall and ignorance very thoroughly when they slander the thousands of upright and law-abiding people of this county with their gross mis-statements."

The above remarks are rather severe. No slander was intended. The officers are no doubt only doing what they think is just and right in the matter.

### JOHN DAY RECAPTURED.

His Little Son Unsuspectingly Causes His Arrest

John Day, the prisoner who escaped from a guard one night last week, was recaptured Wednesday night by Sheriff Painter and Officer Priest, about nine miles east of the city.

Day was convicted at the last term of district court of obtaining money under false pretenses and sentenced to two years over the road. Under the pretense of trying to give bond for temporary release while his case was in the supreme court, Day, accompanied by a guard, went to the country where he effected his escape, but like a fool, he remained in the neighborhood. Day's family lives in West Guthrie and the officers watched the Day domicile. Through this means the fugitive's capture was neatly brought about. A short time since Day's little son was seen going to the country with a basket, containing food, on his arm. The lad was followed, and he unwittingly lead the officers direct to his father's lair. Day now reprints in the county jail. There is a squabble over the \$50 reward offered for Day's recapture, and it is thought several suits will result.

### SHOT IN THE HEAD.

An Unknown Man Found Dead Near Washita.

At Mill Creek near Washita, an unknown man was found murdered with a bullet hole through his head. Supposed to have been dead about four or five days. The body was somewhat decomposed. He is supposed to have been about 30 years old, dark complexion and about 5 feet 10 inches high. There were no papers by which he could be identified. Thirty cents were in his pockets. No clue to the perpetrators.


