

Gen. Rivera Was Fired.

Evans, Oct. 2.—General Rivera, former civil governor of the province of Havana, whose withdrawal from the governorship was cabined last evening, as a resignation, denies that he resigned. He says that he was dismissed and that he does not know upon what grounds the dismissal was ordered. He admits that he had recently remarked that he would resign in the event that at least one out of three nominations he had made to public office was not approved, but he attributes his dismissal to the direct influence of Senator Domingo Mendos Capote, secretary of state in the advisory cabinet of Governor General Brooke.

Senator Capote, according to General Rivera sent asking for the latter's resignation, which was refused.

General Brooke, when approached regarding the matter today, declined to talk for publication, saying that he preferred that any explanation should be made by General Rivera himself. Senator Capote asserts that he requested General Rivera to resign because he was an obstructionist and out of harmony with the administration and that General Rivera replied that he would wait until he was dismissed, which was decided upon. There was no objection according to the secretary of state, to General Rivera's holding certain views but as an subordinate it was the duty of General Rivera to carry out instructions and to not make himself an obstacle. "There was no other way to solve the problem," said Senator Capote.

La Lucha, referring to the dismissal, says:

"The sole cause was the refusal of General Rivera to allow cock fighting, his course in this respect being contrary to a previous order emanating from Senator Capote permitting it."

La Discusion, says:

"The occurrence shows the lamentable lack of harmony between prominent Cubans occupying leading positions. The government must have had exceptional reasons for dismissing such a prominent man."

El Cubano, in an editorial on the general state of affairs, abuses the Americans and congratulates General Rivera on his dismissal, adding:

"Cuba is worse off than formerly when she owned her bad Spanish laws. Now she is worse governed than ever, as both the American and Spanish laws are in force, to be used at the option of the Americans."

GOES BACK TO INDIAN TERRITORY AND GETS ARRESTED

Vinita, L. T., Oct. 2.—The case against F. M. Smith, charged with returning to the Indian country after having been ejected by order of the interior department, was dismissed on motion of the district attorney yesterday afternoon. The trial of Smith a few weeks ago, as will be remembered resulted in a disagreement of the jury.

Smith was re-arrested at his home in the west part of town last night at eleven o'clock just as he was returning from the country, by Budd Kell, Indian policeman and L. P. Ishell, and Kell took him to Chetopa on the night train. He was evidently taken by surprise and started to run away from the officers and was only induced to stop by seeing them draw their guns. When the jury failed to agree at the trial of Smith, the government immediately set to work to tighten its lines and take such steps as would insure no miscarriage in the next trial, should Smith ever return.
