

MEMBERS OF SIXTH ASSEMBLY.
Hon. Walter C. Stevens, Hennessey,

Representative, Sixteenth District.
Walter C. Stevens was born in Lewiston, Maine, August 26, 1868, and soon after his birth his parents moved to a farm county, Iowa, where they remained until the fall of 1871, when they emigrated to Mitchell county, Kansas, and lived on a farm near Beloit, the county seat, until 1879, when his father removed to Beloit and began the practice of law, while the subject of this sketch entered the High school of that place, and afterward graduated with the class of 1884. In 1886 he graduated from the Law department of the Kansas State university, and after an examination in open court, by Hon. J. H. Kilpatrick, of Leavenworth; Hon. L. W. Keplinger, of Kansas City, and Judge Benson, of Ottawa, was admitted to practice at the Douglas county bar, being then but little over eighteen years of age. Soon after being admitted, he formed a partnership with his father at Beloit, Kas., which continued until 1892, when he, like many other, participated in the opening of the "Cherokee Strip." In September, 1890, he was married at Beloit, Kas., to Miss Alice M. Cassey, then a teacher in the public schools of that place, and they had one child, Miss LaVerne, age 13.

Setting in Hennessey, he entered into a partnership with J. H. Anderson under the style of Andrews & Anderson, which continued until his removal to the Republican ticket to the office of probate judge of Kingfisher county in the fall of 1896. At the close of his first term, he declined a renomination for that office, but was fortunate enough to receive the unanimous nomination of his party for representative, and was elected by a large majority, while the district had previously given his fusion opponent, Hon. T. E. Williams, of Lacey, a good majority.

On assuming his duties as a legislator, Mr. Stevens was appointed chairman of the Judiciary committee of the house, and as such was re-

quired to examine and pass upon a large number of the measures before that body for consideration. He was also a member of the Committee on Criminal Jurisprudence, and a member of the Committee to examine into the fiscal affairs of the territory, and also of the "Sifting committee" appointed to determine what legislation pending should be considered during the last days of the session. In addition to the work required on these committees, Mr. Stevens was the author of several bills which became laws, among which were the election bill, and the Roy Cashion Monument bill, the latter providing for the erection of a monument at Hennessey, to the memory of the Oklahoma soldier boy, Roy Cashion, killed while on the charge up the San Juan heights. Upon the adjournment of the legislature, Mr. Stevens was chosen as one of the members of the Codifying committee to prepare the laws passed for publication. Upon the completion of that task, he resumed the practice of law at Hennessey, where he resides. Upon his return to Hennessey, he was appointed as one of the trustees of Kingfisher college, which position he still occupies.

He was elected as one of the delegates from Kingfisher county to the End convention to nominate delegates to the National Republican convention, and was chosen as chairman of the Committee on Resolutions of that convention.

In September, 1900, he was again honored with the unanimous nomination of his party for the position of representative of the Sixteenth district, and again elected by a good majority.
