HARRISON IS OUT

by General Miles recommending that the maximum strength of the new organization be 74,000. In the same note the lieutenant general recommends that recruiting for the artillery service be continued until the full complement authorized by the law for field and coast batteries is obtained.

It is not often that official notes written by General Miles are treated to this much courtesy and this particular one doubtless would have been permitted to slumber in the recesses of a pigeon-hole in the adjutant general's office if it had not been deemed expedient to make it public in order to explain the reason why the army is not to be recruited to 100,000. At the present rate of recruiting it is conceded that a total of 60,000 men will not be raised before Jan. 1 unless the work of the recruiting officers is stimulated by means that have heretofore been avoided.

Governor Wood is Criticized.

Strange stories are coming from Havana about the manner in which Governor General Wood is handling the finances of Cuba. He is charged with diverting hundreds of thousands of dollars from the revenues of the island to special funds without giving any reason for so doing. He caused the expenditure of upward of \$17,000,000 last year. His methods of disposing of the famous Dady claim has exposed him to a great deal of bitter criticism, little of which, however, has found its way into the public prints. Cuban editors are disposed to refrain from talking about the matter, because the crime of lese majeste in Cuba, as in Germany, results in the offended going to jail. General Wood has frequently exercised the arbitrary military authority of his position by suppressing unfriendly newspapers and locking up their editors.

Nobody appears to understand how he settled with Dady. At first he refused absolutely to give the Brooklyn Republican boss a dollar, claiming that he was not entitled to compensation. Then, after reversing himself several times, he is supposed to have transferred \$250,000 from the general revenues of the island to the municipal treasury of Havana, charging the amount against Havana as a loan, and then causing the entire sum to be paid to Dady without the ceremony of issuing a warrant or a voucher.

Have New Subsidy Plan.

The latest scheme to obtain a subsidy from the government is presented in the proposition submitted to the war department today by a number of San Francisco business men that the department enter into a contract with a steamship corporation just formed guaranteeing it the transportation of a certain amount of army supplies to the Philippines at a stated price, to be paid each month. President Newhall, of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, who is spokesman for the steamship promoters, admits that the corporation has no steamers, that it has made no effort to obtain tonnage of any description, and that it does not know whether any can be obtained. The war department has informed him that it has scoured the whole country for months in an effort to secure several first class vessels for the transport service and has secured offers of worn-out old hulls that it would not buy or charter for any price. There is a suspicion in the department that the new steamship company, the primary object of which is announced to be to establish an American line to the Philippines, is the Pacific Mail company in disguise. Indeed, one prominent war department official has received a direct intimation to this effect. This company has been trying for months to obtain a slice of the army transportation business, and, failing to move the government to consider its claims, is now engaged in hooding a steamship company without steamers, but which enjoys the prestige of being composed wholly of American capitalists. If the scheme should be seriously considered it would mean an expenditure of upward of \$50,000 per month by the government.

FOR COLORADO TOURISTS.

The Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad company has asked its competitors in the Western and Southwestern Passenger association to agree to a series of cheap excursions to and from Denver, Colorado Springs and Pueblo for the approaching season on the following basis:

Tickets to be sold from Chicago and all territory up to the Missouri river on June 18 and 25, July 16, 23 and 30, August 6, 13, 20 and 27, at a rate of one fare plus \$3 for the round trip. On July 2 and 9, September 3 and 10, a rate of \$25 is to be made from Chicago and \$15 from Missouri river points for the round trip, intermediate territory to carry proportionate rates and tickets to be sold from Missouri river points one day later than the dates given above. Proportionate rates will be made to and from Glenwood Springs, Salt Lake and Ogden.

A series of eastbound excursions is also proposed, tickets to be sold from Colorado common points every Thursday commencing with June 20, up to and including September 12, at a rate of one fare plus \$2 for the round trip. All tickets to be limited for return passage to October 21.

WHY GIRLS CAN NOT THROW.
There is Good Reason for the Well Known Fact—Too Much Collar Bone.

A great deal of fun is poked at the girls because they cannot throw and hit the object they are aiming at. The general idea as to why girls can not throw as well as boys is that they have not acquired the knack by practice as their brothers have. Another explanation is given by a medical man, which tends to show that girls could never learn the knack, however much they tried.

When a boy throws a stone he crooks his elbow and reaches back with his forearm, and in the act of throwing he works every joint from shoulder to wrist. The girl throws with her whole arm rigid, whereas the boy's arm is relaxed.

The reason of this difference is one or longer and is set lower than in the case anatomy; the feminine collar bone is of a male. The long, crooked, awkward bone interferes with the free use of the arm. This is the reason the girls can not throw well.
