Centuries Filled With Them

M'KINLEY'S FINE COMPLIMENT

Tells People of the Lone State of Their Imperishable Fame

We stand today only in hope, one in faith, one in liberty, one in destiny, the great republic beneath the sun, a republic which the living and those who are to come after will have along to the ages and to civilization.

At the conclusion of the president's remarks, Governor Sayres, on behalf of the people of San Antonio, presented to the president an oil painting of the Alamo.

Mr. McKinley gratefully acknowledged the gift by saying that there was nothing he would prize more highly.

The train left at noon for El Paso, 225 miles away, the longest distance to be traveled during the entire trip without a scheduled stop.

During the afternoon the young ladies of the party enjoyed a novel experience. For about twenty-five miles they rode in the cab of the engine. Late in the afternoon the route dipped southward.

A Speech at Del Rio.

LANGTRY, TEXAS, MAY 4.—Late in the afternoon the route dipped southward and for a time ran along the picturesque cliffs of the Rio Grande.

At Del Rio just before dark the train stopped to change engines and the president shook hands with quite a number of people, some of them Mexicans from across the border, and in response to the calls made a brief speech as follows:

"My fellow citizens: I desire to express the very great pleasure that it has given me to meet my fellow citizens of your great state as I have journeyed through it the past two days. I have been very glad to note your prosperity, the cheerfulness of the people, the secure happiness and contentment, and to know that they are all devoted to the flag, the stars and stripes. I am glad also to perceive the people in this section of the country are interested in wool. Some gentleman says that the only difficulty is the price is not quite as he would like to have it. I wish it were in my power to make it higher for the owner of the sheep and lower for the consumer who has to use the wool. If I could accommodate you both it would be in the end of the matter."

Del Rio, Texas, May 6.—The president and his party spent the forenoon viewing the sights of the quaint old city of San Antonio, with its historic Spanish missions and its thrilling memories of the war for Texas independence and then started on the long stretch across the Texas desert for El Paso, on the Mexican border. Nothing could have been more interesting and striking than the contrast between the old portion of the San Antonio, the strange Spanish architecture, quaint streets filled with the shifting multitude—Mexicans in high peaked hats, their women in bright hooded garments, and couled priests and sweet faced nuns in sombre black and the modern city of stately business houses and residences, asphalted streets and rolling automobiles. The Mexican flag was prominent in the profusion of bunting and banners with which the people had decorated their city.

Governor Sayres, who had met the party at Houston, accompanied them across the state to speed the president on his journey. Gen. McKinley who is in command of the department of Texas together with his staff all in full uniform, and several troops of cavalry from Fort Sam Houston, united with the citizens in receiving the party. There was no time to visit the Spanish mission, owing to the shortness of the stay, but a drive took the party through the old adobe Mexican quarter, past Senator San Fernando cathedral, built early in the last century, where Santa Anna raised the flag of defiance against the defenders of the Alamo to Fort Sam Houston where a battery fired a salute in the president's honor.

A beautiful spectacle in Travis Square where 14,000 school children strewed flowers beneath the carriage occupied by the president and Mrs. McKinley and sang the national anthem.

In the main street opposite the Alamo, where Colonel Travis, Crockett and Bowie and the 28 heroes died to the last man rather than to surrender, and here before an immense assemblage which included the veteran organizations of the blue and the gray the speaking took place. The president was introduced by the mayor of the city and spoke as follows:

"Mr. Mayor, Governor Sayres and my fellow citizens: I wish I had the voice and speech by which I might fitly words to the glorious heroes given to me by your honored mayor for you and in your behalf. I am glad to be in this historic city on this historic spot and receive from you all the greeting and good will which you feel toward the great republic and to the office for a little while I am permitted to fill.

"Here are centuries of heroic memories. The Texas people have a history of which they can well be proud, but in the glory which all Americans and lovers of liberty the world owe want to share. Your ancestors achieved your independence by the sword and as I stand here near the Alamo, this sacred and historic place, I cannot fail to recall the names of Crockett, Travis and Bowie and their heroic associates who went down after eleven days siege, sacrificing their lives for liberty and independence.

"These are men of heroic deeds that cleaved the darkness and beckoned us where we are. Where they fell devoted but dying, the mearest hill, the mightiest river, rolls in glory with their time forever.

"I was glad to receive the welcome of the Grand Army of the Republic and the Confederate veterans. Great applause! Once more reunited and forever, each having respect for the courage of the other and all of us sharing the valor the heroism which were shown on both sides of the line. We know what stuff each other is made of; the men of the south and the men of the north, but we have but one life. We are solid only for the union and flag.

"The sons of the boys in blue and the sons of the boys in gray fought side by side in Cuba, in Porto Rico and in the Philippines and are today shoulder to shoulder, carrying the flag we love, spotless in its mission of liberty and emancipation.

"It was a pleasure to me to be received by the school children of this historic city as I marched through the dust of more than 5,000 and heard them sing 'My Country, 'Tis of Thee, Sweet Land of Liberty.'

"I want to return my thanks, in the moment I shall occupy, to the people of this great empire, to be alone to their welcome to me but for their contributions which they are making for the advancement and prosperity of the republic. No state was ever more blessed by a kind providence than this. You have everything; strong men, fair women and your fields are full of the products and wealth awaiting the use and the cultivation of men. I congratulate you upon this splendid heritage and I join with your honored mayor in saying that
