Saloon Smasher's Husband Says He Will Not Live With Her.
A dispatch from Marion, Indiana, announces that David Nation, husband of Mrs. Carrie Nation, the hatchet crusader, will not again live with his wife. It says he will spend the remainder of his life quietly with his daughter's family. At Marion he celebrated his 73rd birthday today.

The dispatch says:
"Mr. Nation has never really approved of his wife's saloon smashing career. He gave a modified assent for a time, but finally said:
"I can't keep pace with Carrie in this crusade of hers. I am tired out. It is too hard work, and there is too little in it. I used to think she would get into trouble if I did not follow her around, but I find she is able to take care of herself, and I am going home. At times I think she is daft about this saloon smashing business."
"All the relatives of David Nation, except his wife, Carrie, are celebrating his 73rd birthday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Wm. Riddle, at Iberia, O., today. Letters received by the relatives indicate that he is much embittered by his wife's course, and he says he will never return to her or to Kansas."
When asked about the report Mrs. Nation said that she did not know but there was some truth in it. "He has not said so to me though," she said. "When he left Topeka he told me that if I would quit my crusading work and go back to Medicine Lodge he would be satisfied, but I told him distinctly that I would not."
"What did he say then?" was asked. "He didn't say anything; just picked up his valise and went away." That was several months ago.
"Have you been in correspondence with him since?"
