LONG CONTEST SETTLED.

Involving a Valuable Tract of Land Near Chandler.

A very important case has been disposed of at the local land office, the decision being received this morning. This is the second trial. The case was commenced Sept. 22, 1891, when the Sac and Fox country was first opened for settlement. It was the case of Abraham Parker against Reed C. Crawford. A petition for a rehearing having been filed by Parker, the secretary of the interior has denied the petition and closed the case leaving Crawford in possession. The land involved is a tract near Chandler. Crawford first contested Parker, alleging priority of settlement and secured an entry on the land. Parker then contested Crawford for abandonment, alleging that he did not reside on it but lived in the Indian country.

The land office decided the case in favor of Crawford. Parker appealed the case to the commissioners who, reversed the decision of the local office, recommending Crawford's entry to be cancelled. Crawford then appealed to the secretary of the interior, who sustained the decision of the local office and dismissed Parker's contest. Parker filed a petition for a rehearing and Acting Secretary Ryan, after fully considering the facts in the case, has denied the petition and in so doing sustains the decision of the local office.

FIGHTS REQUISITION.

Charles Coulson Objects to Returning to Illinois.

Sheriff A. J. Byers of Coles county, Illinois, is in the territory with requisition papers for Charles Coulson who is held under arrest charged with alleged crime at Mattoon, Illinois.

Coulson is fighting the requisition and has retained a firm of El Reno attorneys to bring habeas corpus proceedings. The case will be heard at Taloga where Judge McAtee is holding court.

Coulson, with his father operated a second hand store at Mattoon and he is charged with buying and receiving railroad iron, brasses, etc., with the knowledge that it was stolen property.

CHARTERS GRANTED.

Belt Mining Company Files Articles of Incorporation.

Secretary Grimes today granted a charter to the Belt Mining company to do business for a period of twenty years at Kingfisher, with a capital stock of \$500,000. The incorporators are: William Cooley, Wildman, Okla.; F. A. Belt, David Belt, H. E. Belt, P. S. Nagle and A. E. Shober, all of Kingfisher.
