TO BEAUTIFY GUTHRIE.

School Children Will Be Asked to Purchase Flower Seeds and Compete for Prizes.

The Guthrie Gardening association, which proposes to encourage the pupils of the public schools up to the eighth grade, to plant flower seeds and thereby help make this city a beautiful place in which to reside, will be the name of a new organization which will be formed in a few days. Dr. Morse who moved to Guthrie recently, is the father of the movement here and is backed by the school committee of the city federation, Supt. Buck of the city schools and others. The plan in brief is as follows:

Flower seeds will be sold in packages to the pupils of each grade up to the eighth grade of the public schools at the price of one cent a package. The pupil is expected to plant the seeds during the spring and summer and at the opening of the fall term of school or at a time designated by the committee an exhibit will be made. First and second prizes will be offered for the best window boxes and display of choice flowers.

The plan has been carried forth in the city of Cleveland, Ohio, with considerable success. It is hoped that the efforts of the association to encourage the pupils of the schools to beautify the lawns and make Guthrie beautiful will meet with general approval and that the property owners will at once remove all refuse, tin cans and rubbish from their property and otherwise assist the association in its work of improving the appearance of the city.

FOR DAMAGES.

Typewriter Company Will Bring Suit.

Special to Daily Leader. Weleetka, I. T., March 28.—Weleetka is promised with the doubtful honor of being the scene of action in one of the biggest damage suits pulled in this district for some time and there are many points which are technical in the extreme, on which the decision will rest.

The district representative of the Typewriter company was in the city last Saturday gathering evidence which he hopes to win a suit for \$2,000 against the Frisco Railroad company. The claims upon which the suit will be based are as follows: On February 14th, which was Sunday, a representative of the company was in Weleetka spending the day there. He alleges that two telegrams were sent here by the company, telling him to go at once to Ada, I. T., where a contract was to be let on Monday, February 15th, by a business college there for a number of typewriters, and the district representative there was sick and unable to attend to the matter. The Oliver representative alleges that the local officials reported that he could not be found, and that they made no effort to find him, and consequently the company will bring damage suit for the amount above named. As he was here all day he claims that he could have been found very easily and the telegram delivered.
