### HOTEL IN "THE WILDERNESS."

The Inside Inn, Wholly Within the World's Fair Grounds, Affords an Ideal Meeting Place.

Accommodations at Modest Rates.

The broad and splendidly shaded verandas and the mammoth and well ventilated rotunda of the Inside Inn, the only hotel within the World's Fair grounds at St. Louis, is an ideal meeting place for friends when they visit the Fair.

This hostelry, which covers an area of 400 by 800 feet, is three stories high and contains 2,257 rooms. Immense wide porches surround the great structure, and as the building was erected in the very heart of what was "The Wilderness," one of the most delightful spots of Forest Park, the giant oaks furnish at all times a grateful shade. Rustic benches, settees, and chairs are generously placed on the porches, and while one waits for his friends he may enjoy each moment in watching the passing throng, and in admiring the architecture of the many handsome structures reared by the states of the union on adjacent sites.

The Inn is in the southeast corner of the World's Fair grounds, near one of the main entrances, and of easy access. A short walk will take the guest to any point in the "main picture" of the Exposition. If he desires to reach the Athletic grounds, the stadium, the six acre rose garden, the 40 acre Philippine exhibit, or the 30 acre Indian exhibit or any other of the thousand and one features he may board the Intramural railway, which passes the door and for one fare he may be landed at the desired place in a jiffy.

Should the occasion require that he go down town he may board any street car that passes the hotel on the south, and on payment of one fare he may reach any point in St. Louis.

One great advantage of being a guest at the Inside Inn is that if one during the heat of the day should become weary, he may retire to his room, take a refreshing bath, indulge in a siesta, and later resume his sight seeing with renewed energy and more capable of enjoying it, because of the brief rest.

The rates governing the Inside Inn are reasonable and were fixed by the Exposition management. Rates on the European plan range from \$1.50 to \$5.00 per day, admission to the exposition included. Breakfast and luncheon are served in a cafe seating 2,500 persons for 50 cents, while dinner is served for 75 cents.

### LIBRARIES THICKEST ON COAST.

Massachusetts' Map at World's Fair Shows that Where Fishes are Plentiful Reading is Most Popular.

St. Louis, Mo., May 10.—What Massachusetts has done to establish free public libraries in the smaller cities and towns of that state is indicated by a map displayed in the palace of education at the World's fair giving the location of each institution. Under state patronage communities have largely increased the number of libraries.

There are 252 buildings on the map and each is represented by a drawing of the original, showing the style of architecture, location and environments. Each of these buildings represents a public library in Massachusetts. In the lower center of the map is a large pen and ink drawing of the Boston public library, which circulates annually three volumes to every inhabitant of the city.

From the appearance of libraries on this map it would appear that the popular supposition that the fish is conducive to brain development is well founded, for the buildings are quite thickly distributed along the coast front. There is a commodious structure at the extreme end of Cape Cod, and the island of Martha's Vineyard boasts of three pretentious structures. Others are at Orleans and Nantucket, but the western and central parts of the state are not without representation by any means.

### QUESTION OF AUTHORITY.

Has the Insane Asylum Commission of the Counties More Power.

The commission appointed by Governor Ferguson to make inquiry regularly into the condition of patients in the asylum for insane persons at Norman, and to order their dismissal if they should not be charges of the territory, is responsible for the raising of a legal question that may lead to considerable litigation. The commission ordered the discharge of a number of patients, among them being two whom asylum officials thought unfit to be at large.

They were reinstated, however, and then, on the recommendation of the counties from which they had come, they were again ordered discharged, whereupon the county authorities enjoined the asylum officials from complying with the order of the commission. Governor Ferguson said today that the question to be decided was whether the county authorities had more power than the asylum commission.

### Bank Changes Hands.

The State bank was sold this week. C. W. Miller, of Tecumseh, being the party to whom it was sold. Mr. Miller is an able business man, is now engaged in the banking business in his home town and also at McCombs, Maud and Wetumka, I. T. The management of the bank here, however, will be under Elmer Everett, cashier, and Bert Bradley, assistant cashier. Both of the gentlemen are thorough business men and up to date bankers, and the bank will be run on the same solid principles for which it has been noted.—Sparks News.

### Savage for Representative.

John W. Savage of Beaver county, is a candidate for Representative on the Republican ticket from the Nineteenth district, which is composed of Beaver and Woodward Counties. Savage is a young cattleman, who was connected with the last legislature as private secretary to Senator Charles Alexander, president of the senate.

### WATER WORKS AT TISHOMINGO.

Contract Let to Houston Firm—Six Miles of Pipe.

The contract for laying the water works system at Tishomingo was let there today to Taylor & Moore, of Houston, Texas. The contract price is \$26,500 and the agreement stipulates that the work shall commence within thirty days.

It will require about five months to complete the contract and about six miles of pipe will be laid. The water will be secured from Pennington creek.

### INTEREST IN NEW LINE.

Indian Territory Anxious for Kansas City, Oklahoma & Houston.

Tulsa, I. T., May 10.—Interest in the proposed Kansas City, Oklahoma & Houston railroad is increasing in this town through which it is scheduled to pass and the business men are exerting themselves to raise the bonuses required. At a mass meeting recently held at South McAlester, a company representative submitted a proposition asking for a bonus of \$50,000 in cash and a tract of forty acres of land, for depot grounds, shops and right of way purposes to the distance of thirty miles out of town south. It was accepted with enthusiasm and it is believed that the amount will be raised readily.

As surveyed, the line will run from Kansas City through the towns of Eufrasia, South McAlester, Claremore and Boswell in the Indian territory. In order that the interests of South McAlester may be properly looked after, the town has organized an independent company, composed of local capital, known as the Red River & Gulf company. The company is capitalized at \$2,000,000. It will construct the lines south from South McAlester to Red river, a distance of eighty miles. The purpose of this is to develop the 2,000,000 acres of valuable pine lands soon to be opened to allotment and settlement in the Choctaw nation. Heretofore the Dawes commission has refused to allot these lands, alleging as a reason its desire to protect the Indian from the white trader who has shown an unusual desire to get hold.
