Little More Than a Girl, Yet Her Life Is Full of Sorrow.

Queen Wilhelmina is only about twenty-three at the present time, little more than a girl, yet already she has lost all trace of her old gladness, all trace of her old vigor. She seems to look at life now from the standpoint of a middle aged woman, one who is more prone to fear than to hope. The loss of her child was for her, as for all Holland, a terrible blow. Then not only has her marriage proved a failure, not only is she glad for life to a man between whom and herself there is no sympathy, but she has had to sing a Tekel over the friend in whom she placed all her trust.

It was a rude shock for her, no doubt, when she found that the Kaiser was playing fast and loose with the Boers and had no thought of risking a single soldier for their sake, but it was a much ruder shock when she found that all the while he was talking to her as if his one wish on earth was to help her and serve her he was scheming against her—scheming to rob her people of their independence—nay, more, was using her as a tool wherewith to tempt them into paths fraught with danger.

That she knows now that he on whom she used to look as her all powerful protector is the enemy Holland has most to fear, and Holland is dearer to her than life. She is practically alone in the world and can hardly be blind to the fact that she is alone because she allowed him to estrange her from England, the one power that could and would have stood by her. And her own people are beginning to look askance on her, so sorely are they disappointed that she has not yet given them an heir. Meanwhile there are industrial troubles in her own country, troubles of all kinds in her colonies, and the Achille's are proving themselves too strong for her soldiers.—London World.

But Girls of Smith College Attend "Letty" Just the Same.

Northampton, Mass., Nov. 23.—Smith college girls are agitated because of the refusal of the management of the "Letty" company, in which William Faversham is starring, to return the price of tickets to young women who decided not to attend the performance.

Finero plays are considered beyond the pale by the college faculty, and on Sunday President Seelys asked the girls in chapel not to visit the academy, a request equivalent to a command. President Seelys said that a friend who attended the production in New York left the theatre out of respect for his wife.

"No decent woman can afford to be present," said Dr. Seelys, who also stated in the theatre lobby that he regretted he had not sufficient influence

to bar the play from Northampton.

Yesterday afternoon a procession of college girls headed for the academy gave Manager Charles Lothian false visions of a crowded house. No sales of tickets were made. Instead the young women desired to have the theatre buy tickets already purchased.

As diplomatically as he could, Manager Lothian explained the iron-clad rule of the profession never to relinquish a dollar after it has found its way into the treasurer's coffers. Some of the young women left in high dudgeon, while others seemed inwardly pleased at the prospect of having to witness the play in order to receive their money's worth. As it was, more than one hundred Smith young women were present.
