## OPPOSED TO MERGING

### INJUNCTION PROCEEDINGS OF INTEREST TO ALL PRESBYTERIANS

#### CASE BEING HEARD TODAY

#### Decision of Appellate Court Anxiously Awaited

Springfield, Ill., Jan. 3.—Members of the Presbyterian and Cumberland Presbyterian churches throughout the country are deeply interested in an injunction suit that came up for hearing today in the appellate court in this city. The injunction seeks to prevent the union of the two religious bodies and was filed by members of the Cumberland Presbyterian church. No apparent opposition to the union exists among the members of the Presbyterian church of the United States.

The general assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian church at the annual meeting held in 1903 at Nashville, Tenn., passed a resolution submitting the question of union of the two branches of the denomination to a vote of the membership. At the general assembly held in 1905, at Fresno, Cal., the vote of the Cumberland membership was canvassed and showed a majority in favor of union. At the meeting of the general assembly of the Cumberland church held last May at Decatur, Ill., the proposed union was formally decided upon.

There was a minority report on the matter, however, as many of the members of the Cumberland Presbyterian church are bitterly opposed to the merger with the Presbyterian church of the United States. The minority report recited the fact that a total of \$7,396,560 worth of property belonging to the Cumberland church or under its control would revert to the Presbyterian church, and the objecting members held that there was no authority in the constitution of the Cumberland church which sanctioned such a step. On the contrary, they held that it was directly opposed to both the spirit and the letter of the fundamental laws of the church.

James Milliken University, of Decatur, Ill., is one of the institutions controlled by the Cumberland Presbyterian church and, as the last general assembly of the church was held in that city, injunction proceedings to prevent the continuation of the union were commenced there by the members of the congregation who are opposed to the change. It is these proceedings that are now up for hearing and the result of which is awaited with great interest by the members of the two churches everywhere.

#### CHILDREN OF ARCHDUKE OTTO.

Vienna, Jan. 2.—It has just been publicly disclosed that since the death of the Archduke Otto, which occurred several months ago, two letters from him have been found, one being addressed to the emperor and the other to his brother, the Archduke Franz Ferdinand, disclosing the fact that he was the father of two natural children, aged five and six, by a Viennese actress. The Archduke Otto implored the emperor to take care of these children. It is reported that his majesty gave the sum of 200,000 crowns for the maintenance of the children, but the Archduke Franz Ferdinand gave nothing. The mother of the children was present with the Archduke Otto until his death, retiring only when some member of the imperial family paid a visit to the sick room.

#### SAPULPA BRIEFS.

Sapulpa, I. T., Jan. 3.—The gas companies in this town are involved in a war. They both claim the franchise, and the city claims both are void. The Sapulpa or John Smith company was enjoined from furnishing any gas within the city limits by the Central Light & Fuel company. Both will be tested in the courts.
