That will be a crucial day when a reasonably good constitution is introduced by a Republican convention at the instigation of the holdovers.

Oklahomans will not soon forget the yellow advertising given to Oklahoma in the East by a vilifying Republican press bureau and its boosters.

Of course no one supposed that those who so rapidly vilified the constitution would not reaffirm it when cornered. That is part of the game. Nerve is one of the main assets.

The square thing would be for Republicans to join the Democrats in the campaign for statehood and the constitution and make the fight for the office on party principles. Free Republicans is that not the truth?

The Republican leaders say that Oklahoma will be taking a backward step by paying the constitution made by Democrats. That is a mistake: it is the Republican leaders that will be taking the back seat—that is all. But that is what hurts.

The Shawnee News, a Republican paper, has a view of the situation that is worth consideration. It says: "The Shawnee News believes it to be for the best interest of the state, as well as the city of Shawnee, to accept statehood at this time and remedy the defects of the constitution at a later time."

The average Republican office-seeker may have a good many bad tricks, but he has a little horse sense when it comes to cash deals. He is not looking for ratholes to pour his money into. Renning for office and kicking the constitution from under him don't, somehow, strike his good ideas of thrift.

McGUIRE AND FERGUSON. Ex-Governor Ferguson is right in his position that it will be a hard matter to defeat the constitution. That was true when he said it, and the truth is cropping out more clearly every day.

Of course McGuire stands on the basis with all the holdovers. He has a job already. His pay goes on just the same if the constitution is defeated. If he can only defeat the constitution his present job as sole representative of the people of Oklahoma is secure. Why should not McGuire be with the kickers heart and soul?

If McGuire were like other aspiring Republican candidates he might see a great light and experience a wonderful change of heart.

It takes a good deal of nerve for McGuire to get up and ask the Republican candidates to spend their time and money running for an office and then attempt to kill the very constitution that creates the office, in order that McGuire and Filson and those of the pie counter gang may hold on to the sure things they already have.

If McGuire and others like him want to fight other aspiring Republicans, why don't they resign and get down to the grass roots with the other boys? There is a little too much loudly nerve manifested in such proceedings to suit the common, everyday Republicans, and they are kicking about it, too.

A BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION. Mayor Duke, the city council and officers have made good. On Thursday night they passed over the reins of government. They leave behind them an excellent record of good deeds and not one single act that in any way reflects either upon themselves or upon the good name of the city. This is a great deal to say of any man, or body of men, but it only sets forth the truth concerning the administration of city affairs for the last two years.

When Dr. Duke and the council went into office, it was under a promise to give the city a business administration. They have fulfilled the letter and spirit of that promise and are entitled to the lasting respect and admiration of the entire city. They have set a high standard of efficiency.

During the last two years Guthrie has prospered as never before. The finances of the city have been greatly improved, the expenses have been reduced without encroaching on efficiency and a large amount of improvement has been made and paid for. The credit of the city has been

raised to first grade standing and finances have been placed on a cash basis.

During the last two years there have been more industrial enterprises started than in any other period of double that length of time. The cotton compress, the cotton mill, the Houghton cotton seed oil mill, the laundry, the canning factory and numerous other important factories have come to the city. Others are contemplating coming at an early date. Building and business have gone forward with rapid strides.

The city has never been more prosperous than it is just at this time and much of the credit is due to the able administration of Mayor Duke and the loyal support of the council and officers.

To them the people of the city owe a lasting debt of gratitude and will always continue to place upon their services the high value that their integrity and ability so justly earned.

CONVENTION SHOULD STAND PAT. (Shawnee Herald.) Now that the Oklahoma supreme court has upheld the constitutional convention in its division of counties in Western Oklahoma, the clouded atmosphere about Guthrie has somewhat cleared, yet it is not free, by any means, of further litigation. The court in concluding its decision declares the creation of the supreme election board by the convention was without authority; that it was in conflict with the enabling act and the Oklahoma statutes. This opinion is not shared by some of the strongest legal minds of the state. In fact the question was thoroughly entered into before the convention provided a plan for the management of the election and canvass of returns.

So confident are the leaders of the constitutional convention that they have not violated their authority, that it is highly probable the case will go to the United States supreme court where an effort will be made to restrain the Oklahoma election board, headed by Governor Frantz, from meddling with the first state election in Oklahoma.

This determination should be backed by the solid vote of the constitutional convention. The body has assumed nothing and should be willing to defend its enactments by any effort demanded and go to any extreme.

Past history of the Republican election machine in Oklahoma is sufficient to cause the people to desire their elimination from any participation in the new condition of affairs.

Even the Oklahoma supreme court ruling on the election board seems like a glaring instance of this character.

He is at present commandant of the staff college and the infantry and cavalry school and signal school at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.
