Cruce Campaign Conducted on a High, Honorable Plane

Oklahoma City, Okla., April 24.—A strenuously object to the use of my name for the purpose of advertising joint debates by rivals for the gubernatorial nomination," said Hon. Lee Cruce, of Ardmore, who arrived at his headquarters at the Lee, Monday noon. This statement was made when his attention had been called to the announcement in two local newspapers that he would meet Doyle and Haskell in a debate in Oklahoma City next Friday night. Mr. Cruce insists, as stated in his letter to Haskell, that there is no desirable ground in the present campaign between Democrats who stand for the constitution. Unless some reform of the organic law is opposed by Doyle or Haskell, Mr. Cruce will not meet them in public discussion, reading that his opponents are inclined to pursue a personal campaign which will lead ultimately to factional differences. "Party above the candidate," is the Cruce conception of Democracy. Mr. Cruce is much pleased with the

condition of his campaign. He has spoken to large and enthusiastic crowds nightly, many of the places visited having been included in the itinerary of the so-called "Anti-Debate." At each point he has fearlessly taken up and met the personal charges preferred against him. Letters showing into headquarters indicate a tide to Cruce wherever the three gubernatorial candidates have spoken. Mr. Cruce will speak at Muskogee, Wednesday night; Chickasha, Thursday night; and Medford, Friday night. The Chickasha meeting will probably be one of the largest held in the campaign. Instead of going on the stump to meet his opponents, Mr. Cruce declares the people of Oklahoma can find the strongest denial of the gross misrepresentations hurled against him by inspecting the endorsements that have been given him by the Farmers' Union of District No. 21; the Ministers' Alliance, of Ardmore, representing every religious denomination; the Union Review, official organ of the Farmers' Union, as well as the ringing

testimonial signed by the presidents of every branch of organized labor in Ardmore. These endorsements cover the moral character of the candidate, his past and present political record, his fitness to hold the office of governor as well as every phase of his residence in Indian Territory. Friends of Mr. Cruce declare it an easy matter to hunt scandalous accusations at a man, but to secure the endorsements at home from people who willingly refute the allegations, is a matter not every candidate for governor has as yet been able to present. That Cruce is a good Democrat, a good citizen, a friend of labor, a friend of schools and churches, is proven by those who know him best—his home folks. Slanderers to the contrary Cruce hopes to keep his campaign free from mud throwing. He appeals to the intelligence of the people, to the loyalty of his party to measure men for what they are worth, not for what they are capable of saying.

PER DIEM QUESTION AGAIN.

(By Associated Press.) Chicago, Ill., April 24.—The per diem question, which has bothered the railroads almost as much as Roosevelt and his big stick, is again up for consideration at the spring meeting of the American Railway Association at the Auditorium hotel today. Hope is expressed by the railroad managers that the subject will be finally disposed of at this meeting. The roads will probably concern in making the per diem rates a part of the association business, or separate it entirely and let it be handled by the "car blue" committee, which was the plan started last fall. A number of the roads refused to become a party to this agreement last fall, and such roads are still paying the 25-cent-a-day fee for cars of other roads, while the companies that did sign the agreement are paying and receiving 50 cents. A proposition is now up to advance the charge to \$1 a day.
