### WEST TO THE VOTERS.

Candidate for Attorney General Makes Telling Address. Evid. May 15—Chas. West, candidate for attorney general, has issued the following:

In soliciting your support for the Democratic nomination for attorney general of the new state of Oklahoma, I do so not merely that a personal favor may be conferred upon me, but because I believe that I am able to render to you a special service.

There is no office in the gift of the people of more importance than the one for which I ask. No matter how good your governor, how faithful and capable your corporation commissioners, how wise and honest your legislators, unless your attorney general is honest, courageous, energetic and efficient, the work of all the others becomes of very little value.

Among the many questions that must be considered by the attorney general of Oklahoma, one class of problems impresses me as being paramount in importance at this time. I refer to the means of controlling the railroads and the fuel trust. My indictment of the railroad, as they conduct their business at present is four-fold.

First—Their rates are exorbitant.

Second—Their rates are discriminatory.

Third—Their freight service is inadequate.

Fourth—Their methods of operation are careless of the comfort, health and lives of their employees and the traveling public.

The question of rates, more especially of freight rates, has been fully discussed recently in the newspapers and the courts. A mere statement of the conditions as they are and have been will suffice.

The rates on coal have been \$1.50 in Oklahoma, when \$1.20 is charged for the same service in Texas; and have been \$2.75 in Oklahoma when they were \$1.50 in Arkansas for the same service. The local distance rate on coal has been, on an average, 150 per cent of the Arkansas and Texas rate; and the Oklahoma commodity tariff is 125 per cent of the Arkansas and Texas tariff.

These conditions are absolutely in violation of the law. There is no necessity whatever for their persistence.

To put an end to them no new legislation is needed, not a thing is necessary but an attorney general who is able and willing to enforce in the courts the law as it now exists. Last October I requested the attorney general to bring certain actions and when he failed to do so, I requested that I be employed as special counsel in those actions and as such, on that theory outlined in the previous paragraphs, I brought a number of actions, fought some of them to a successful conclusion, and would have won others had the Republican attorney general allowed me to go ahead.

In these cases I have attacked:

First—The existing scale of rates.

Second—The practice of arbitrariness.

Third—The rates on coal from the Indian Territory.

Fourth—The inferior equipment and carelessness of human life on the part of the railroads.

Fifth—The coal combination and its prices.

Sixth—The prices enforced by the all trust.

Both in the courts and before the Interstate Commerce commission it has been absolutely determined that corporations engaged in a public business must give the public adequate service at reasonable rates, and without discrimination. This has been demonstrated to be the law and it now remains merely to enforce it.

It is upon this basis that I ask for your support. The other gentlemen who are candidates for the same office may be good speakers, good lawyers, pleasant to meet; these things, however, are not the real issues that Oklahoma people must decide upon. If you want a fair deal from the railroads, if you want the coal trust compelled to sell coal at reasonable prices, and to anybody who wants it, if you want discrimination destroyed, if you want the employees of the railroads and the traveling public protected, I shall be glad to have your support, because these are precisely the things I am pledged to give my every effort to bring to pass.

And I thank you for the interest and sympathy which you have shown in what I have done thus far. I think I am safe in promising that if I am nominated and elected, the rights of the people along this line will be protected.

Washing Rugs at Home.

Small Ones Can Be Made to Look as Bright as New.

The value of soap bark in cleaning wooden dress materials is known to nearly every woman who makes over dresses. An enterprising housekeeper recently found that she could use it in washing a small oriental rug with most gratifying success.

She got a five-cent package of the soap from the drugist and steeped it for two hours in a quart of water. Then she strained it through a cheese cloth bag, so that the fine particles of the bark would not stick to the rug.

Into the bath tub, which was half full of warm water, she poured part of the clear, brown liquid made from the soap bark. Then she put the rug in, well beaten and swept, into the water and pounded it with a stick. The water was soon very dirty. She let this water run off, added the tub half full again and put in more soap bark liquid.

Then she drew the rug up over the edge of the tub, three or four inches at a time, scrubbing it across with a stiff brush as she did so. After two rinsing waters she hung the rug on the line in the sun and wind. It dried after several hours and was exquisitely soft. It was also cleaner than it had ever been after being sent to the carpet cleaner. The colors were richer and the design itself seemed clearer.
