MOORE'S CARD TO FARMERS UNIONS

Elmer, Okla., May 22.—To the Farmers and Labor Organizations of Oklahoma and Indian Territories:

We toiled long and hard for statehood; at last congress gave us an enabling act, which provided that we elect delegates to write a constitution for our state.

We elected these delegates, and you know how faithfully they performed their duty. They have given to us a constitution that will absolutely protect our wives and children, against the avaricious greed of the railroads and other monopolistic powers. We do not believe, but know that we, the people, have an unquestionable right to vote on said document; and to say whether or not it shall be our organic law.

This right is being denied us. Let us plead with you to rally irrespective of your politics around the constitution, by meeting and organizing, at every school house, town, and hamlet, and demand of Gov. Frantz, or W. H. Murray, that this constitution be submitted to us and the great masses of the people, for our approval, or rejection; regardless of any injunction or decision against the document. This constitution is null and void, in fact a dead letter until it is adopted, by the vote of the people of this state, and approved by the President of the

United States, therefore any decision rendered by any court on this constitution, at this time must be and is, absolutely null and void.

We are fighting the battle of our lives. Let us assert every bit of the manhood that lies within us, and demand the rights that are due us as free American citizens. Forget not that this fight is between the great masses of the people, and the avaricious greed of the great monopolies.

Shall we win, or shall we lose? It is with us. If we lose we may rest assured that, for many years to come we are to be pillaged and robbed, as has been shown, by the statement of the attorney general of Oklahoma, who states that we are paying annually in excessive freight rates, to the railroads, the neat sum of \$4,500,000, and remember, as he has also proven that we are being absorbed annually to the tune of millions of dollars by the cotton seed oil trust, lumber trust, coal trust, and other kindred combines. With the constitution promulgated in force, we will be able to protect ourselves against this high-handed robbery.

Let me again appeal to you and plead with you to organize, and organize at once; and let us demand our free rights and prove that we are not cowards.
