COMPLAINT AGAINST PHONE CO.

HEPBURN SPRUNG ALLEGED PROVISIONS OF CITY FRANCHISE

MAXIMUM RATE SPECIFIED IN ORDINANCE

Vigorous Fight Against Proposed Raise Will Be Made Before Corporation Board

In his complaint filed with the Oklahoma corporation commission yesterday, James A. Hephurn, county attorney for Logan county, alleges:

That the Pioneer Telephone and Telegraph company is a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the Territory of Oklahoma (now state) and operating and maintaining a public telephone exchange in the city of Guthrie, Logan county, Oklahoma; and that said company is the only company operating or pretending to operate a public telephone system in the city of Guthrie, and your complaint and the other citizens of Guthrie, Oklahoma, are obliged to rely on said company for any service by telephone which they desire.

That heretofore, on the 13th day of July, 1908, the mayor and city council, acting for and on behalf of the citizens of the city of Guthrie, Oklahoma, passed an ordinance to wit: "Ordinance No. 447, granting a franchise to the Guthrie Telephone Company, its successors and assigns, the right to erect, operate and maintain telephone lines in the city of Guthrie, Logan county, Oklahoma Territory," that as part of said contract and as a consideration for the rights granted by said city by virtue of said franchise, the said Guthrie Telephone company agreed that they, their successors and assigns, should not charge for the use of its telephone instruments and service within the city of Guthrie to exceed the following rates: Two and one-half (2 1/2) dollars per month for business telephones and not to exceed the rate of one and one-half (1 1/2) dollars for residence telephones used in said city.

That the said company further agreed that in the event that a subscriber used a telephone for business purposes and also at the same time used the telephone for residence purposes, the cost of said residence telephone should not exceed one (1.00) dollar per month for each and every month said residence telephone was in use by such subscriber.

That heretofore and after the passage of said ordinance said franchise was transferred by this defendant, and the complainant alleges that this defendant is now the successor and assignee of the said Guthrie Telephone company.

That on or about the 21st day of July, 1908, the said telephone company arbitrarily and unreasonably notified the complainant and other citizens of the city of Guthrie, who are subscribers to said Pioneer Telephone and Telegraph company's exchange, that on the 1st day of October, 1908, the rates for said telephone services would be raised as follows:

Special line business.....\$3.96
Two-party line business.....2.50
Special line residence.....2.00
Two-party line residence.....1.50
Four-party line residence.....1.25

and notifying the complainant and others similarly situated that beginning on said 1st day of October, 1908, all telephones already installed and all telephones to be installed must be paid for at the above mentioned rate. The complainant for himself and other citizens of Guthrie, subscribers to said Pioneer Telephone and Telegraph company's exchange alleges that said advance rates are arbitrary, unreasonable and unjust. That the rates prevailing at this time have been and are sufficiently remunerative to said company, that the rates so advanced and demanded by said company beginning on the 1st day of October, 1908, are extortionate, unreasonable and unjust to the complainant and to the citizens of the city of Guthrie; that no improvement of service or facilities has been made by said company to justify such an advance in rates.

The complainant alleges that he and other citizens of the city of Guthrie will be compelled to pay said unjust, unreasonable and arbitrary rates on threats of having their telephone service discontinued on and after the 1st day of October, 1908, and that the telephone service is necessary to him and other citizens of Guthrie, in the conducting of their business and in their public relations, and he prays that the defendant company be enjoined to show cause why said telephone rates should be raised by said company, and that after a hearing and investigation, that the corporation commission

CALIFORNIA BROWN PELICAN

Its Method of Finding Attracts Attention at Seaside.

The pelican family in the visitor at the seaside resorts of Southern California is known as the "CAB" bird, brown pelican. His length is from four to five feet and his wings are tall and are of silver gray streaked. He seals brown.

The breeding range of this interesting bird is off the coast of Mexico and over California. Most of June are the nesting months. Ordinarily they build their nests in trees, but occasionally they construct their built of wood sticks and sticks of a lined with grass.

At the seaside, the pelicans are seen flying high in the air. It is their fashion to fly one behind the other. Each following the signal from the leader, gives five or six strokes and then all soar in unison. At feeding time their vent is to drive the fish by a noisy beating of the wings to a point close in shore, where the birds will dive from considerable heights. This performance is quite spectacular, with loosely folded wings the birds drop as a ball head foremost into the water. Under the water they evidently turn a somersault, as the bird invariably emerges headfirst.

The pouch or gape bag of the pelican will hold ten of fifteen pounds of fish, and as the bird is provided with no means of defense he is the victim of some thing operators and confidence workers in the form of predatory gulls. Too lazy to fish for themselves these thieves will pursue and attack the pelican, causing him to dive as a matter of self-protection. So closely are the pelicans pursued by their more agile enemies that finally, half exhausted, they give up the trophies of their chase. This they do with a cynical smile as they see their hard-earned gain gobbled by the gulls.

BREAD CURE

FOR DIVORCE

Atlantic City, N. J., July 24.—Good bread would cure the American divorce problem, according to Dr. H. M. Wiley, head of the national pure food commission, who addressed the American Bakers' association at their annual convention here.

"Give the American man good bread and you will make him a portion of the home and household," said the originator of the "police squad." "When the bakers make good bread and then educate the people to buy their wares," he added, "the great destroyer of home and family, dyspepsia, will be removed, and we will hear no more of the divorce problem."

"Wife's bread has been more the cause of domestic felicity than any other, and when this is removed we will find less trouble. We find that lots of bread in this country is not fit to eat. I don't know whether you fellows made it or not, but I am going to tell you that something is wrong. I don't see any reason why the color nature gave to flour is objectionable."

The pure food commissioner declared that he blessing process by which much of the flour is treated is detrimental to the wholesomeness of the bread.
