No sooner was the animal inside the ball room, than she became excited and began to do a turkey trot and tango all of her own, which threw the dancers into an uproar of fright and compelled them to seek safety wherever it could be found.

WIFE, A TUBERCULOSIS VICTIM, KILLS SELF WHEN LEARNS TRUTH

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 31.—George Henry, tuberculosis victim, is en route to a new lease of life in a Colorado sanitarium, unconscious of the fact that his wife, whose sacrifice gave him fresh hope, lies in a coffin. Henry and his wife Rose, both tuberculosis victims, waited a long time for the city of Chicago to work through the political preliminaries and build a much talked of million-dollar tubercular sanitarium. Finally they grew discouraged and went to a doctor.

"Go of you go straight to Colorado," said the doctor. "It's suicide for you to stay here." A slender bank account made it impossible for both to go. Henry begged his wife to take the next train. She refused and, over his protests, packed his clothing, kissed him goodby and saw him off to the train. Two hours later neighbors found Mrs. Henry dead in her bedroom. The windows were down and three gas jets wide open.

POULTRYMEN OF COUNTY HOLD MEETING IN GUTHRIE

A meeting of the poultrymen of the county was held yesterday upon call of L. K. Meek, of Mulhall, vice president of the Oklahoma State Poultry association. After a thorough discussion of the matter it was agreed by all present representing the several poultry organizations of the county, that they organize into one permanent County Poultry association to be the only county association and be known as "The Logan County Branch of the Oklahoma State Poultry Federation."

Officers were then elected for the year as follows: President, L. K. Meek, Mulhall. First Vice President, Dr. J. W. Duke, Guthrie. Second Vice President, W. R. Howard, Navina. Third Vice President, J. R. Homen, Crescent.

Secretary, A. C. Powell, Crescent. It was voted to hold the first annual show in Guthrie in February if the local poultrymen and business men would make proper provision for same.

TIMELY ATTENTION TO DIET MAY PROLONG CAREER OF MANY

Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 31.—The importance of a periodic examination of the individual to determine whether there has been developed a change in his relation to his food, which, he said, is the great danger that particularly threatens the brain worker, was urged by Dr. Louis Faugeres Bishop of Fordham university, in an address here today before the Social and Economic Science section of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

"The life of a brain worker," Dr. Bishop said, "should consist of 40 years of preparation and 40 years of fruitful labor, but many leaders in thought are found giving out in the fifties, nearly all of the remainder in the sixties with only a few enjoying active work in the seventies."

"Of the importance of rest, recreation and exercise in the prolongation of efficiency, too much can't be said, but there is a large group whose efficiency and longevity depends upon diet. It may happen at any time to any brain worker, that he may develop an idiosyncrasy against some particular food which may start a process of degeneration in his cells that eventually leads to his loss of efficiency and finally to the loss of his life."

The importance of industrial education was discussed at the opening session today of the social and economic section. Judson C. Wall of New York, advocated the establishment of technical museums.

ENDORSE HASKELL'S OIL PLAN

OKLAHOMA CONGRESSMEN WILL URGE REMOVAL OF RESTRICTIONS

Washington, D. C., Dec. 31.—Protests are reaching the interior department from Oklahoma against modification of the policy of not granting leases aggregating more than 480 acres of oil land in what are known as departmental leases. The policy has been followed by the interior department for some years, and is chiefly applicable to Indian lands in eastern Oklahoma.

Recently ex-Governor C. N. Haskell and William Cowles of Tulsa, promoting construction of an oil pipe line from Oklahoma to tide water, made application to the department for removal of the lease acreage limit, representing that the Lutch-Schell interests, which, with others, are understood to be financially backing the enterprise, could not see its way clear to support the new pipe line unless the restrictions were waived.

Recent publications of the plans drawn in Oklahoma brought from reputed independent oil producers of Tulsa, Nowata, Bartlesville, Muskogee, Okmulgee and Ardmore numerous protests against changing the department's policy. It became known today that the Indian bureau sent telegrams to Oklahoma oil producers inviting further opinions as to the policy of either removing the limit on acreage that may be leased or extending it materially.

Members of the Oklahoma delegation in congress said last night the delegation had endorsed the new policy asked for by Haskell and Cowles believing that in affording increased facilities of transportation the Oklahoma oil industry would be materially benefited. It was pointed out that Oklahoma and Mid-Continent oil field generally is short on pipe line capacity, and that rates charged by existing lines were too high, considering the service performed.
