The deceased left Genoa, Italy, on the steamer Pindie, accompanied by Mrs. Lutz and a doctor who was in charge of him. Through Wilhelm Lutz, a brother one of the commissioners of the port of New York, arrangements for the body were made by wireless, when three days at sea. The remains were placed in a hermetically sealed casket. Charles and Adelaide Lutz, the children, who were at school at Wellsley, Massachusetts, joined their mother in New York, as did Mr. Fred Bulkley, of Salina, Kansas, and they all accompanied the body to Guthrie. Other than these relatives who attended the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Bulkley, parents of Mrs. Lutz, Salina, Kansas; Mr. W. S. Bulkley of Oklahoma City, a brother and his wife. Wilhelm Lutz arrived in Guthrie from New York Thursday night.
