"MISSING LINK" OF HORSE IS DISCOVERED

Berkeley, Cal., March 5.—The missing link in the evolution of the horse has been discovered in the Miocene strata of the Southern Sierra Nevada. It was reported to the Pacific Coast division of the Paleontological Society of America in convention here today.

The fossil form discovered by J. P. Bowdler of the University of California is that of a three-toed horse of the Merychippus type, long sought by scientists to fill the gap in the history of the horse. It is said the fossil fits precisely the description of a hypothetical animal which scientists maintained must have existed in horse history.

"HE'LL FLY BRITISH FLAG FROM AMERICA TO HELL"

New York, March 5.—The White Star liner Baltic, carrying 18,000 tons of war supplies, steamed from this port for Liverpool today. Her commander, Captain J. B. Ransom, said as far as he was concerned he "would fly the British flag from America to hell," notwithstanding German submarines.

It was said that the Baltic carried in her holds merchandise and foodstuffs sufficient to fill 1,200 freight cars. On her decks were lashed 40 semi-armored automobile trucks which were consigned to the British government for use, it was said, by English troops in France.

OIL BELT RAILROAD IS WINNER

STARTS OUT WITH MORE BUSINESS THAN IT CAN HANDLE

Oilton, Okla., March 5.—William Murdock, traffic manager of the Oil Belt Terminal railroad, has the distinction of being the only such official, perhaps in the world, to ask for less business for his road. Murdock was through here yesterday, going over the line with General Manager Long. There are now more than five hundred cars of freight distributed along the road, waiting an opportunity to get into Oilton and be unloaded, and one thousand cars more have been contracted. Murdock has thrown both hands up and asked the Frisco company to please not route any more cars over the Oil Belt Terminal until the bridge over the Cimarron river is completed, now about ten days off, and the cars now on the track can be unloaded.

Several weeks ago the Oil Belt Terminal officials announced they were ready to receive business. Today they wish they had postponed the announcement. Because of the congested condition of the road, loaded cars standing everywhere, it is almost impossible to get a train over the line from Jennings to Riverside, from which point the shipments are freighted into Oilton. And the cars kept coming. It was then that Murdock asked for a let-up.

In addition to the shipment of general merchandise and material into Oilton, the heavy traffic is caused also by the building of additional pipe lines and steel tanks in the field, just south of Oilton. With the bridge over the Cimarron completed, several trains will be run from Jennings to Oilton daily.

PRICES OF BREAD EXPECTED TO TUMBLE

New York, March 5.—The state attorney general's inquiry into the cause of the high price of bread here was concluded Thursday after forty-eight out of fifty retail bakers who were summoned had testified.

Alfred L. Becker, deputy attorney general, said that further action will depend on the result of a joint conference which he and Myer Nussbaum, the referee in the proceedings will have with Attorney General Woodbury.

Speaking of the results of the inquiry, Mr. Becker said: "I believe that a decrease in the price of bread will be brought about much sooner than might otherwise have been expected."

Spiro Kochovas, grocer, testified he had been instructed by a Ward Baking company driver to raise his retail price of bread to 6 cents. James Theodore, also a grocer, testified that drivers for both the Ward and the Cushman Baking companies told him the day bread went up to 6 cents, "if you don't sell our bread at 6 cents we will refuse to supply you further."

Other grocers denied the Ward drivers asked them to raise the price of bread. Herbert B. Lanyon, a baker, testified that although flour costs him more than \$7 a barrel, it costs him only 2 cents and a fraction to bake a loaf of bread; that he sold it whole sale at 3 1/2 cents to one grocer, who sold it at retail at 4 cents.

OVER MILLION BARRELS OIL FROM THLOCCO LEASE

Oilton, Okla., March 5.—Dr. Howard Weber of Bartlesville, who with the Black Panther Oil Company operates the Barney Thlocco lease just south of Oilton, said yesterday that the lease is now producing 6,000 barrels daily and there are five wells on the sand which would double the daily production. Over one million barrels of crude oil have been taken from this lease. Dr. Weber bought his interests from former-governor C. N. Haskell, the reported price being \$70,000. Weber is one of the best known men in the Oklahoma fields having brought in the north extension of the Nowata field. He was visiting yesterday with President Joe Hall of the Oil Belt Terminal railroad.

GIRL'S REVOLVER DRAWN IN COURT

Huntington, Ind., Mar. 5.—A tragedy was narrowly averted at the hearing of the criminal case against Edward Tobias when Miss Frances Kauffman, the prosecuting witness, drew a revolver and attempted to shoot Tobias in the crowded courtroom.

The girl was seated at one side and a little in front of Tobias. When J. H. Fox, foreman of the jury, informed the court that no decision could be reached and asked dismissal Miss Kauffman turned suddenly toward Tobias, rose to her feet and drew a revolver from her clothing. J. E. Griffith, clerk of the court, ran and grabbed her. Sheriff Scott disarmed the girl. As she was being escorted from the courtroom, Miss Kauffman collapsed. Physicians said she was suffering from hysteria, a result of a long nervous strain during the 10 days' trial.

Tobias, who is a Kokomo photographer, was charged with being the girl's betrayer. He also faces two suits for damages asking \$10,000 each with Miss Kauffman and her father as plaintiffs. Charles R. Jialler, attorney for Tobias, says the girl has also threatened to kill him.

BRIDGE COMPLETED WITHIN TEN DAYS

Oilton, Okla., March 5.—The steel bridge, now being built over the Cimarron river here for the Oil Belt Terminal railroad, will be completed within the next ten days, according to William Murdock, traffic manager of the road. The third span has been put in place and the fourth span and the south-side approach will consume about ten days time in completing. Trains will then be run into Oilton immediately. General Manager R. D. Long, Murdock and other officials went over the line yesterday.
