MASSAGE BRINGS THIS MAN TO LIFE

BREATHING RESTORED FOR THREE HOURS AFTER POISON KILLS HIM

Boston, April 1.—After Willard O. Wallace, of Pittsburg, an alleged confessed swindler, who took poison in the city prison, had been pronounced dead, his heart action was restored by massage and he lived in an unconscious condition three hours more before he was again pronounced dead.

Wallace was on his way to court to answer charges of larceny by false drafts on banks at New Orleans, San Francisco and Portland, Ore., when he told an inspector that he had swallowed poison. After prison physicians had worked over the man for an hour they pronounced him dead, no heart beat being perceptible, and turned the body over to the medical examiner.

Restored Nine Minutes Later. It was nine minutes later, by the medical examiner's permission, that Dr. William H. Brickley, of the hospital staff, began a trial of manual massage. An incision five inches in length was made and through this Dr. Brickley thrust his hand and gently massaged the heart.

In fifteen minutes the color of the man's face had changed from purple to red and heart action was once more apparent. With constant massage by the eight members of the hospital staff, working in relays, life was maintained for three hours.

He Didn't Like to Stop. When arrested last night Wallace was allowed to keep about \$20 in his possession. This he spent on dinners for himself and four men who were confined in nearby cells. "I've had a high old time for the last few months; I don't like to stop" he is said to have told the cell attendants.

The police say that Wallace had been known variously as C. K. Hitchcock, Claude Howard and S. S. Conrad.

HAWSER AGAIN SLIPS ON HULK OF F-4

(By Associated Press.) Washington, D. C., April 1.—Efforts to raise the sunken submarine F-4 in Honolulu harbor were temporarily suspended after a hawser with which the boat was being dragged toward shore snapped.

Rear Admiral Moore reported from Honolulu late today that the submarine evidently was waterlogged and too heavy to be raised by the equipment employed by the searching fleet. This destroyed any faint hope that might have been left of finding any of the crew of twenty-one alive.

The homeward trip had been started when the Frisbie jammed her nose into the rock.

There was a rending crash of timber that could be heard plainly by the crowds on the Marina, the exposition's water front promenade. Cries of the excited passengers mingled with the prolonged distress whistling of the craft.

Panic prevailed on the steamer. The impact threw many passengers from their seats.

Many rushed about wildly, especially the children and it was with difficulty that the ship's officers managed to calm them.

Boats from the warship nearby immediately were launched and with little trouble all the passengers were taken off the Frisbie and rowed to shore.

The vessel, listing heavily, is supported by the rock and probably will be saved.

Judge Sentences Them to Work for Ford



JUDGE ALFRED K. NIPPERT. Judge Alfred K. Nippert of the county court of common pleas in Cincinnati has accepted the offer made by Henry Ford, the Detroit automobile manufacturer, to care for convicts and reform them.

Mr. Ford told the Federal Industrial Relations commission, when he testified before it, that he would be able to reform all the prisoners in Sing Sing if they were sent to him. That was not done, but Judge Nippert made an arrangement with him by which prisoners could be sent from Cincinnati to the Detroit plant.

One Cincinnati man has been sent to the Detroit plant following his arrest as a result of being out of work and unable to furnish his wife and child with food. The young man who was sent to the Detroit plant, instead of to jail, has written the judge and is well satisfied.

WILLARD TOWERS OVER J. JOHNSON

CHAMPIONSHIP SLUGGING MATCH IN CUBA, MONDAY, PROMISES FEATURES

New York, April 1.—The history of the prize ring offers no parallel of the battle for the world's championship in which Jack Johnson and Jess Willard will engage next Monday at Havana, Cuba. Big men have fought for this premier title of fistiana since the early days of the eighteenth century but never through the long list of champions from James Figg to Jim Jefferies have two fighters of the physical proportions of Willard and Johnson crossed arms in the roped arena.

Of the champions of modern times, Corbett, Jefferies and Johnson, all passed the six foot mark while Sullivan, Sharkey, and Fitzsimmons were from one to three inches below this height. When the negro title holder and his challenger step into the ring next Monday, Willard will tower six feet six inches in the air while Johnson will stand five and a half inches below him. In weight these fighters are also far above the ring average of the heavyweight class.

Next to Jim Jefferies the Goliath of modern ring times, Johnson is the biggest man who ever held the title. Jefferies weighed 220 pounds and stood six feet one and a half inches in fighting shoes; Johnson is six feet one half inch tall and weighs about 225 pounds a condition; Jim Corbett scaled 187 pounds, at his best and was 5 feet 1 inch tall; Fitzsimmons was one and one-fourth of an inch shorter and fought at about 170 pounds; Sullivan stood 5 feet 10 1-2 inches, and fought at 195 pounds; Tom Sharkey was five feet nine inches, and fought his best bout at close to 190 pounds.

Compared with these past heavyweight gladiators Willard appears as a Samson. Even when ranged alongside of Johnson the Kansas cowboy over shadows the negro title holder in almost every point of physical measurements. In addition to his 5 1-2 inches, advantage in height and ten years difference in age he outweighs Johnson by twenty pounds. His reach of 83 1-2 against the negro's 76 inches will also prove of exceptional value if properly used. In all the measurements of trunk and limbs, Willard shows an advantage in structure, muscle and chest expansion varying from two to four inches.

To offset these physical assets Johnson has the benefit of ring wisdom and craft cultivated during his long career as championship contender and holder. Just as Willard surpasses Johnson in every point of physical make up the Galveston pugilist excels the Kansas boxer in all departments of the science of giving and evading glove punishment. With youth and power ranged against experience and skill the battle is likely to develop into a contest in which ring strategy will equalize brute strength and courage.

Johnson's ring assets are well known but uncertainty clouds Willard's prospects. In his short period of active glove battling he has never faced an opponent of the power, skill and experience of thirty-eight years and while Willard must be accorded the advantage here it is likely that the champion's offensive and defensive skill in both boxing and clinching will nullify this to a considerable extent. In the closing rounds of the battle it is probable that endurance and courage will play an important part.


FITZ WILL BE MARRIED BY REV. BILLY SUNDAY
