TEMPERANCE AND SAVINGS IN RUSSIA

A consular report from Petrograd records a tremendous increase in the deposits in the savings banks in Russia the phenomenon being attributed chiefly to the closing of the vodka shops and the prohibition or restriction by the provincial and local governments of the sale of intoxicants generally. For the year 1913 the aggregate deposits in the institutions in question amounted to \$17,250,000; for 1914 the total was \$42,900,000—more than double. For the single month of December 1912, the total was only \$461,000; for the corresponding month of 1914 the total was \$14,987,000—more than fortyfold. For the first two weeks of January of the current year total deposits were nearly \$4,000,000, as compared with a pitiful \$455,000 for the two corresponding weeks of the previous year.
