

LONG FIGHT OVER RIVER BED LEASES SETTLED

Oklahoma City, Okla., June 10.—Settlement of controversies growing out of the taking of sand and gravel from the river beds of the state was perfected with practically all of the old river bed sand gravel lessees at a meeting of the state school land commissioners Wednesday afternoon.

Under the new agreement the lessees will pay two cents per ton for all sand and gravel taken from the river beds.

No lessee will have a monopoly of any portion of the river beds, they all being declared open territory. Elimination of the feature which gave the lessee a monopoly on certain portions of the beds is the only material change made in the new agreement. It was stated. The contract of the Price Sand & Gravel Co., which gave that concern complete monopoly over a certain portion of the Arkansas river bed, was revoked and another contract entered into according to the same agreement with the other lessees.

Pometa, Okla., June 10.—Lightning has done a vast amount of damage in the Oklahoma oil fields, during the past few weeks, as the records show that seven 5,000 barrel steel tanks have been destroyed, and one 37,500 barrel, valued at \$100,000, together with their contents, about 250,000 barrels of crude oil. Many smaller fires, caused by lightning, have also occurred, averaging a loss of \$1,000.
