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## GERMAN SHOPS IN MOSCOW ARE LOOTED BY MOBS

### POLICE UNABLE TO QUEL RIOTING IN PROGRESS FOR TWO DAYS

### BUSINESS OF SHIP SINKING GOES ON

### GREECE FAVORS ALLIES; LEMBERG IN NO DANGER; MACKSEN ALONG FRONT

London, June 14.—The British steamer, Hopemount, of thirty-three hundred tons, was torpedoed and sunk off Saint Ives, England today, by a submarine. The crew was saved.

London, June 14.—The British steamer, Arndale, of thirty two hundred tons, sank this morning as the result of striking a mine in the North Sea.

London, June 14.—Six British and two Danish ships were torpedoed Saturday night and Sunday.

Rioting in Moscow.

Moscow, June 14.—Moscow for two days has been the scene of street rioting and anti-German demonstrations.

The riots have been so serious that the police are unable to control the crowd.

The demonstration started because of an outbreak of illness among the laborers of a certain factory.

The lower classes believed the Germans had poisoned the drinking water.

All day Thursday and Friday the crowds looted German shops.

### Provinces in Greece Favor The Allies.

Paris, June 14.—An Athens dispatch says the candidates of the party of M. Venizelos, the former premier who resigned on account of his policy favoring war on the allies' side, were elected in Athens and elsewhere throughout the Kingdom.

A change of ministry will be impossible until parliament meets and the session may be postponed by the government forty days.

### Mackensen Holds Entire Eastern Front.

Berlin, June 14.—It is officially announced today that General von Mackensen has occupied the Russian position along the entire front in the eastern arena of fighting from Czernawa to Sienawa.

### Lemberg in No Danger.

Petrograd, June 14.—The Russian successes near Juaravno, Galicia, on the left bank of the Dniester, and Ugartzberg, on the right bank of the Dniester, are highly gratifying to military circles and have resulted in the expression of a distinctly optimistic feeling in the press and among the people.

## OLD LAND MARKS WILL BE RAZED

### ROCK ISLAND RAILROAD WILL MAKE IMPROVEMENTS IN OKLAHOMA AVE. PROPERTY

The old frame building on the corner of Oklahoma and Vine streets, immediately across the street from the Municipal bath house, will be torn down within the next ten days. Word to that effect has been received by the city commissioners from the general offices of the Rock Island railroad in Chicago. A special inspector was here several weeks ago and examined the company's property and at that time agreed with Chief Mitchell that the building should be condemned. The Rock Island owns the two rock buildings just west of the frame and contracts have been let to remodel them. New glass fronts will replace the old ones and the buildings generally remodeled inside. The lots left vacant by removal of the frame building will temporarily be made into a park.

## MILLIONS IN CHICAGO WALK TO THEIR JOBS

## STRIKE OF STREET CAR EMPLOYEES TIES UP ALL LINES IN WINDY CITY

(By Associated Press.)

Chicago, June 14.—A million and a half Chicagoans walked to work, or motored or used steam roads this morning as a result of a strike of fourteen thousand street car employees.

Not a wheel moved after four o'clock this morning, when the crews took their cars to the barns.

The railway company announced that no cars would be operated today. The strike was carried out without disorder.

Records of the transportation companies show an average of 3,994,000 persons depend on the lines for daily transportation, of whom 2,400,000 use the surface and 600,000 the elevated lines.

The union plan of arbitration, submitted last night, would involve a direct wage increase of more than \$750,000, according to the reply of the concern involved, and the payment of bonus time in excess of \$400,000.

## WINNSBORO SEES RIOT IN WHICH 5 ARE WOUNDED

### MOB ATTEMPTS TO TAKE PRISONERS; TWO WHITE AND BLACK STORIES

Kansas City, June 14.—W. E. Horton, a negro, convicted of highway robbery and Samuel Richmond, white, handcuffed together, escaped from Sheriff Ralph Martin, of Cherokee county, Kansas and his deputy, today at Ninth and Main streets, while the officers were waiting for a trolley to take them to Lansing prison.

### White and Black Again.

Winnsboro, S. C., June 14.—A white man named Eisenhauser and Utes Smith, a negro, charged with criminal assault, were killed and five officers wounded, Sheriff Hood probably fatally, during a riot, early today, when a mob attempted to take Smith from the officers.

During the fight that followed, Smith's body was riddled with bullets.

## JUNE TERM OF FEDERAL COURT BEGINS TODAY

This will be the sixth time the Hammon case has been up for trial. The case is first on the docket this time and a trial will probably result.

## THREE REPORTED DROWNED NEAR O. C.; HUNDREDS ARE HOMELESS

Oklahoma City, Okla., June 14.—The treacherous Canadian river is again out of banks at Oklahoma City and El Reno. Hundreds of acres of fertile farm land is submerged in dirty water. Five bridges are reported out and three lives lost since early Monday morning. More than 200 families in the bottoms at Oklahoma City have been forced to abandon their homes; many houses have been swept away. The lower part of the city is under water. The added rains of the morning has made the situation critical in the extreme. Firemen and volunteers as well as gangs from all railroads are guarding the stricken parts of the city.

### "Be it enacted by the general assembly of the state of Frankland, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that from January 1, 1789 the salaries of this commonwealth be as follows:

- "His excellency the governor, per annum, 1,000 deerskins.
- "His honor, the chief justice, per annum 500 deerskins.
- "The secretary to his excellency, governor, per annum, 500 raccoon skins.
- "The treasury of the state, 450 raccoon skins.
- "Each county clerk, 200 beaver skins.
- "Clerk of the House of Commons, 250 raccoon skins.
- "Members of the Assembly, per diem, three raccoon skins.
- "Justices' fees for signing a warrant, one muskrat skin.
- "To the constable for serving a warrant, one mink skin."—New York Tribune.

## FALSE FRIEND IS SLAIN BY AN IOWA TOWNSHIP FARMER

H. J. Lipscomb, Iowa township cotton farmer is dead and Arthur Ford, his tenant is being sought by Sheriff Sherwood, charged with murder.

The shooting took place early Sunday morning at the home of Ford near Luther. Lipscomb, it is said was unduly familiar with the 19 year old wife of Ford, and Ford set a trap to catch the pair. He told his wife he was going to Oklahoma City on business. At about 2 o'clock Sunday morning he returned unexpectedly and found his wife and his landlord together. The death of Lipscomb followed. Lipscomb was found with his throat cut and his skull crushed in. The wife received a terrible beating at the hands of her infuriated husband but escaped with her life. She walked 12 miles to her parents home in her bare feet and with a blanket as her only covering.

Ford is 32, his wife 19 and the slain man 51. Lipscomb leaves a wife and three children.

## NEW NATIONAL PARTY WITH WM. BRYAN AT HEAD

### NATIONAL PROHIBITION, PEACE AND SUFFRAGE PROPOSED PLATFORM

### HOBSON TO SECOND BRYAN IN MOVE

### POLITICIANS WATCHING POLITICAL DEVELOPMENTS WITH KEEN INTEREST

(By Associated Press.)

Washington, D. C., June 14.—A new national party, headed by William Jennings Bryan for President and Richmond Pearson Hobson for Vice President, is one of the political possibilities that is being discussed here as the outcome of the break between President Wilson and Bryan and the retirement of the latter from the cabinet.

Three principal planks are contemplated for the platform of the new party. They are: National Prohibition. Universal Peace. Woman Suffrage.

With the issuance of his statement of defense, explaining why he deserted the cabinet, Mr. Bryan, it is believed, has severed his connections as a leader of the democratic party and has placed himself in a position where it will be impossible for him to support Woodrow Wilson for another term. Although denying that there was any political significance in his retirement and attributing to the President the highest motives of patriotism, Bryan has alienated the friendship of the most influential party supporters of the President and brought down upon himself the denunciation of the greatest democratic newspapers. It is difficult to see how Wilson and Bryan ever again could go before the country advocating the same platform.

On national prohibition their opinions are irreconcilable. Wilson stands for the settlement of the liquor question by the states through the local option method. Bryan advocates the suppression of the liquor traffic through constitutional amendment. He has gone so far as to urge in the Commoner the adoption of a prohibition plank by the next democratic national convention.

As to woman suffrage there is as wide a divergence of views. The President has consistently refused to bring any influence to bear upon congress in favor of suffrage, while Bryan has actively advocated such legislation.

As to the general proposition of universal peace, everybody favors it, but the past few days has divulged the tremendous difference of opinion between the President and Bryan as to the practical application of the theory. The President stands for a "peace with honor" policy, while Bryan is known as the leader of the "peace-at-any-price" faction.

Politicians here are watching developments with the keenest interest and they will not be surprised to see the situation so shape up as to make Mr.
