THROW LIGHT ON THE DINGY BACK YARDS

GUTHRIE WOMAN TELLS HOW TO MAKE COMMUNITY LIFE A PLEASURE

As a tree may be known by its fruits, so, as a general thing, may the character of one's back yard throw light upon the personality of its owner.

Of course, every cabbage patch may not have its Mrs. Wiggs, for many ladies of that desirable make-up do not exist in the humbler walks of life, or, if they do, they have not "found themselves," but from the patches of ground one sees it is plain that every spot is made to have a character of its own, and that money has comparatively little to do with it; that there are people who make a howling waste and desert place to blossom as the rose.

Take the little square of ground with flitting lights and shadows falling over the neatly cut green turf, free from weeds. There is a well-kept fence over which trails a blossoming rose or perhaps a trellis with a honeysuckle. The brick walk glistens with sweeping or repeated washing, or perhaps the walk is a simple one of gravel or cinders. A tiny border of blooming plants lift their festive heads. Perhaps some thriving vegetables take the place of flowers, but still a delightful air of cleanliness, serenity and comfort is reflected. An immaculately kept chicken yard and snowy fowls suggest fresh eggs. No unkempt household articles suggest domestic processes, for clotheslines, cans, milk bottles and other articles are put away from sight. One feels like looking over the fence to congratulate the owner on his contribution to pleasant community life.

Then there is the dusty, forsaken square of ground, that suggests the "deserted village," with rank grass growing. The kindly ministrations of the broom, lawn mower, hoe or spade are unknown and sundry tin cans, broken implements and other undesirable articles obstruct the view. Old bits of clothesline are always in sight. The garbage can is never put away out of the hot sun.

Over these conditions, we must charitably draw the veil, and feel thankful that there are people who are able and glad to work with heart and hand for making community life a pleasure and a benefit to their fellow creatures. Their work may be far-reaching so that in time all members of society will contribute garden spots which will also be places of health and comfort for their personal use.—L. D.

Russians Make Desperate Stand.
London, July 6.—Much activity is apparent in all the three elements where the warring powers come into actual contact but reports as to results generally are contradictory.

Berlin uses a "reliable source" for the denial that a German battleship of the pre-dreadnaught type was sunk by a Russian submarine at the mouth of the Danzig Bay, but the official report from Petrograd on the occurrence is accepted as correct by London, where resumption of the naval operations in the Baltic has been watched with intense interest.

Reading between the lines of the various official papers it is not difficult to deduce that the Russians are making a desperate stand between the rivers Pruth and Danester. Grand Duke Nicholas, commander-in-chief of the Russian forces, reports that the fighting in southern Poland is of the most desperate character, while Vienna admits that the Russians are attacking in strong forces. Anstranger German sources, however, declare this effort to be a forlorn hope.

YOUR MOTOR CAR MUST HAVE TAG

Oklahoma City, July 6.—"A certificate to show that you have paid your tax will save you from being arrested for driving your automobile without a tag," Highway Commissioner A. S. Leecraft was telling everyone today. The first shipment of tags for autos were gone, and motorists, fearing arrest for driving without a blue and white tag, were clamoring. A carload of tags are on their way," Leecraft said. "They will be here in a few days, and until they arrive the certificate is all you need to keep off the cops and constables."

COMMISSIONERS MUST MAKE TAX LEVY, IS RULING

Replying to an inquiry by Frank M. Gault, president of the state board of agriculture, the attorney general's office has ruled that when a majority of the voters of any county shall petition the county commissioners for a tax levy to co-operate with the federal government in tick eradication, it is mandatory upon the county excise board to make a levy for such purpose.
