Welch Files Report. A total of \$315,967.99 was collected in the fiscal year ending June 30 by the state insurance department, while

just \$15,889 was expended according to the annual report of Insurance Commissioner A. L. Welch, filed Friday with Governor R. L. Williams.

Paying Production Tax. The fact that an attack has been made on the constitutionality of the new gross production tax law is not preventing many oil companies from paying their portion, according to State Auditor E. B. Howard. Howard made this statement Friday after turning \$5,000 in the state treasurer. The \$5,000 came to the state auditor's office in Friday's mail.

Sand and Gravel. In the month of June the state received \$1111 from its sand and gravel beds on the Arkansas river, according to figures compiled Friday by Secretary George Smith of the school land commission. As these beds are inexhaustible, Secretary Smith believes the state, in the future will secure considerable revenue from them. Leases are permitted to the sand for 2 cents a ton.
