lower than the Texas rate. Most of the freight traffic originating in Texas county and outbound from Texhoma is grain. There is an unusually large crop of wheat there this year and it is practically all being exported. Hence is being shipped through Texas to Galveston.

The railroad at Texhoma runs north and south. One end of the depot is in Texas and the other end in Oklahoma. By driving their wagons to the south end of the depot farmers having grain to ship (sending it for export) bill it out on the Texas grain rate, which is 11 cents to their advantage, for if they billed it out at the north end of the depot, which would be in Oklahoma, they would have to pay the interstate rate. This is accepted by all concerned as nothing but fair, and while there is an advantage to the farmer, it does not injure anyone else, and the railroads are not responsible for this condition.

Cattle Pens in Oklahoma.  
Oklahoma livestock raisers in that section apply the same practice in shipping livestock. There are cattle pens at the north end of the depot.

The Oklahoma Panhandle is beginning to attract attention and a great many men are coming there and buying land. The wheat possibilities draw them. Land there that will produce just as good wheat as the Kansas high priced land can be secured at a price much lower.

J. E. Patton, one of the principal grain men of that section, is now building his third elevator, and it is to be the largest west of Hutchinson, Kansas. He will build two more before the season is over, and there is plenty of grain there this year to do it.

DREAMS FOR NEW COUNTY ARE SHATTERED

NEW LAW PROVIDING BOUNDARIES KILLS EFFORT OF SHAFER COUNTY MEN

Pemeta, Okla., July 19.—The dreams of the Shaffer county enthusiasts have again been shattered, and as a result there is no likelihood of county cutting this year. Two years ago the people of Cushing, assisted by many of those living within the proposed county, made a campaign to have Shaffer county created, including within its confines practically all of the Cushing oil field. After a several weeks campaign, however, the proposition lost by a narrow margin at the polls. A Shaffer county ticket was elected by the creation of the county failed, and the men who were elected to office found themselves without a county in which to serve. The proposition, two years ago, would have included portions of Payne, Lincoln, Creek and Pawnee counties.

The Shaffer county fight was taken into the legislature, during its session the past winter, and attempts were made to pass amendments that would prohibit the creation of new counties. This failed and amendments were introduced that forbade the location of a county boundary within fifteen miles of an established county seat, and when this was defeated, in twelve miles of such town. All attempts, however, were lost, and the law remains which permits new counties but the boundary may not be within ten miles of a county seat.

Shaffer county enthusiasts again got busy, this spring, and began shaping up for another vigorous campaign. They believed without a doubt that they could win this time. They snapper out their proposed county and then sent delegates from Cushing to visit Drumright, Olton and other towns within the proposed new county, soliciting help and votes, to spring the proposition and ask for an election when the citizens of Chandler, the county seat of Lincoln county, spoiled all the plans.

The proposed Shaffer county, this time, would include portions of Payne, Lincoln, and Creek counties. Because of the big oil field, there would thus be created the wealthiest county in the state. The present law provides, however, that no new county boundary line may be located within ten miles of an established county seat, and it was on this one proposition that gave the citizens of Chandler their opportunity and they ac-

Completed by extending their city boundary line two miles further north. In order to make Shaffer county and keep away from the ten mile limit, it was necessary for the Cushing people to form a stair way boundary line on the south. In no other way could they keep ten miles away from Chandler. No trouble was encountered in keeping the required distance from Stillwater on the west and Sapulpa on the east, the county seats respectively of Payne and Creek counties.

The stair step border was nicely prepared and surveyed when Chandler people upset the plans. The city council of Chandler simply extended their north boundary two miles northward. This took away from the proposed Shaffer county two of the ten mile limit and it also put a crimp in the formation of a new county at this time. It is understood that Chandler has subdivided a strip two miles long, sort of a lane in fact, and had also erected electric light poles that far out and given the people of that section the benefit of electric lights.

A hotel proprietor "rusted" around and found a room which was temporarily vacant while Ma occupant, Miss Daisy Hunsaker, was at her home at Jefferson. He explained this condition to the Wichita girls and gave the use of the room to them.

The girls stayed Thursday and Friday and then returned to Wichita. When Miss Hunsaker returned she declared that her trunk, which she had left in her room, had been opened. Articles missing were a wine-colored silk dress, a lavender silk petticoat, a blue silk petticoat, an Illinois pennant, lingerie and other garments.

Miss Hunsaker started Mr. Johnson, field deputy in the sheriff's office, on the trail, and he came to Wichita yesterday.

They knew nothing about the missing articles, they said, but the Illinois pennant at their home furnished a clue. attempt to accomplish that very thing. At the time the bill was pending in the legislature Mr. Welch was under impeachment charges and his trial in the senate after adjournment of the legislature resulted in his complete vindication.

The interest of the larger insurance companies in overturning the law is in the fact that it takes a great deal of their business management, they allege, away from them and turns it over to the local agents in this state. Does Away With Certain Practices.  
The provision that attempts to secure to the local agents all the commissions allowed will upset the practice that has been made of placing large lines of insurance through brokers in some of the central cities. Such companies have intimated that if the law shall be upheld they will find it more profitable to leave the state and handle the big policies here without the intervention of local agencies.

The suit is being prepared and will probably be filed in a short time, but the chance of getting it tried in the regular course seems to be slight before the end of the summer, owing to the vacation period being on for the courts.



Moulding Automobile Mats Under 1,000 Ton Pressure

Single Hydraulic Machine Makes 850 Mats Per Day



The popular impression that rubber companies manufacture automobile mats exclusively, is refuted by the above photograph taken in the Milwaukee plant of the Federal Rubber Manufacturing Company. This machine moulds rubber matting for motor cars at the rate of 850 square yards per day. As the average motor car takes one yard each for the front and rear compartments, it will be seen that this single machine can take care of quite a respectable output from a big motor car concern. The two operations of vulcanizing and stamping the mats are carried on simultaneously, six mats being placed in the machine at one loading. The ten cylinders beneath the machine exert a force equal to 1,000 tons pressure against the surface of the matting. Single orders for 100,000 yards of matting have been received by the Federal Company from one of the largest makers of cars in the country.
