DETROIT VOTES ON CAR LINE OWNERSHIP

few miles of track on the old Pingree three-cent fare lines are the eight for a quarter tickets good at all hours.

If municipalization carries the traction system will be managed by three commissioners serving without pay. They will be James Couzens, until recently vice president of the Ford Motor Car Co.; John P. Dodge, of the Dodge Motor Car Co., and James Wilkie, of the Parke-Davis Chemical Co.

Criticism of the plan includes opinion that it will make a political football out of the lines. To this answer is made that the commission will have complete power, that the mayor is pledged to retain in office the commissioners named, and that the commissioners have agreed to stay in office. Labor organizations have objected on two grounds, namely, that the plan will invalidate the arbitration agreement between the company and the union, and that the civil service proviso of the plan will weaken if it does not disrupt the union.

That the voters do not know precisely what the lines will cost is another objection raised. An appraisal of the lines by Prof. E. W. Hemis gave the value of the property as \$17,500,000. At one time the com-

pany declined a municipal offer of \$23,285,000 for the lines. According to the present plan the valuation will be fixed by the circuit court of Wayne county (Detroit). The plan provides that a rate of fare sufficient to meet all obligations shall be charged, and it has been argued in some quarters that this might result in a higher rate.

must co-operate; man must do the things he is commanded to do and in the manner required and then the results will surely come. God is always willing and ready to do His part if we but give Him the chance.

If we, His people, are faithful, if the churches in Guthrie will but fill these conditions and requirements set forth in this text, He will fill His promises. But we must do our duty; we can have just what we go after; the result will be just what we make it by our own actions and by our faith in God's promises.

But we are so prone to allow our pride to be a stumbling block to our entrance into the joys of our Master's blessings. Sometimes it requires a little adversity to bring us down to earth; to convince us that we are just mortals; that we must realize that our pride must be humbled. What keeps you from speaking to some one about their soul's interests; simply your pride.

Our Sunday clothes and our religion too often go together; are generally hung up together in the closet. Sunday night, there to remain till another Sunday. In this revival if we will but put away our pride; if we will but come down from our high perch; if we will but do what God asks us to do, and in the way He wants us to, and tells us about in this text, we will soon be accomplishing some great things for the kingdom—not until then.

A revival also works a revision of our prayers. But we do not know the real seriousness of effective prayer. We do not know what it is to sweat blood as did Jesus when He prayed. Why, a lot of our prayers are really a joke. Now, let us get down and pray and seek the face of God, as enjoined in this text. You are spending your time looking at the face of the evangelist instead of looking for the face of your God. We must get more in the habit of prayer; pray as we walk along the street; pray as we go about our business. These prayers will not interfere one with another.

Then followed a quarter of an hour of silent, serious communion with God; short prayers for the purging of the hearts of the church members beginning "right now," for a preparation for the revival which the evangelist declared was just beginning in Guthrie.

HERMAN RIDDER, NOTED DEMOCRAT, IS DEAD

New York, Nov. 2.—Herman Ridder, treasurer of the democratic national committee, and publisher of the New York Staats-Zeitung, died suddenly late Monday at his home in this city.

The cause of Mr. Ridder's death was kidney trouble in an acute form. He had been ill about ten months and for two weeks past his condition had been critical. He was in his 65th year.

Members of his family were summoned to the bedside late Monday when it was seen that he could last but little longer.

Among a large number of prominent German-American citizens of the United States Herman Ridder was one of the most conspicuous figures in the newspaper publishing business. For many years he held offices in the Associated Press as treasurer and a director. In politics he was such a factor that he was talked of at the national democratic convention at Denver in 1908 as a possible nominee for vice president on the ticket with Bryan, whom, however, Mr. Ridder opposed at that time. He also was discussed later as a like selection for ambassador to Germany.

shouting "viva Carranza," and fired six shots at Jones, who was patrolling near the boundary close to the customs house. The American soldier is not seriously wounded.

First General Attack Monday Night

Douglas, Ariz., Nov. 2.—What appeared to be a general attack on Agua Prieta began at 6:30 o'clock Monday night when the Villa forces began firing from all sides and advanced on the town.

The firing ceased when the Villa troops had reached the wire entanglements on the east side of Agua Prieta and began to dig themselves in.

Meanwhile the Carranza garrison was sweeping from all sides of the town with rifle and machine gun volleys guided by searchlights. Although it was believed the volleys went over the heads of the Villa forces, cheers rang out in the Carranza trenches as every volley was fired.

Four shells and a brief discharge of rapid fire by Villa forces drew a new salade from the Carranza trenches at 8:55 and at 10 o'clock Monday night. Calles reported his losses Monday

as eight killed and twenty-four wounded. He claimed the dash of the Villa troops to the Agua Prieta barbed wire entanglement; had been repulsed with a loss of at least 200 to the Villa troops.

American Badly Injured.
Within a few minutes after the first gun was fired, machine gun bullets and shell fragments showered over American territory, seriously wounding Louis F. Taylor, a restaurant waiter, and endangering scores of American soldiers in trenches south of the United States army camp, two miles east of Douglas.

Taylor was shot down in front of the United States custom house, where more than seventy machine gun bullets sped among a throng of soldiers and Mexican women and children, who were coming across the line. The bullet struck him in the middle of the back as he turned to run to cover, and his spine was seriously injured, paralyzing him almost completely. Shells and fragments of shells fell near the Slaughter ranch house.

Gen. Thomas F. Davis, commanding the 6,000 American troops on duty at the border, promptly warned the commanders of both Mexican factions to change the direction of their fire and citizens of the American side were not endangered thereafter.
