

Fourth Annual Valley Fair Greatest in History of County

Nearly Five Thousand Paid Admissions Were Registered at Gates Thursday; Hundreds Came From Outside County.

Fair Weather and Crispy Atmosphere Augment Attendance

Results of Booster Campaign Apparent on All Sides; To Women of City is Due Lion's Share For Fair's Success.

With nearly four thousand tickets sold at the gates, the attendance on Thursday at the fair reached over seven thousand people—the sale of season tickets this year was very large. At least a thousand visitors came in with the auto caravans from the neighboring towns and half as many on trains and interurban cars.

Friday is a fitting climax of the greatest fair week ever known in Guthrie. With weather better than if "made to order," the records of all previous fairs is today being beaten. The paid admissions for Thursday were far beyond any expectations and expectations were placed at high water mark.
