RUMANIANS IN FULL FLIGHT TRANSYLVANIA

sylvania the official statement reports, the Rumanians are falling back. From the Geister forest the Teutonic forces have pressed into the Alt valley and fought their way forward. Bucharest Admits Withdrawal.

Bucharest admits that in the face of superior forces, mostly German, Rumanian troops have been withdrawn from Hermandstadt to Brasov (Kronstadt) to the Carpathian frontier. The Rumanians desire to insure better defense of the frontier passes.

In Macedonia the contending sides have been engaged for the most part in artillery duels. A like condition prevails on the Austro-Italian front.

British Take Lesars.

On the western front in France the British have captured Lesars and also made gains north and northwest of Courcolette and southwest of Guendecourt. The Germans have reoccupied the British trench positions that had been taken from them in the

region north of Lesboeufs.

The Franco-British thrust of yesterday on the Somme front is characterized by German army headquarters today as a new attempt on a large scale to break through the German lines between the Ancre and the Somme. The effort failed and only it is declared at Lesars and at isolated points to the south were the attacking forces able to enter German positions.

There was a gathering of allied cruisers off the New England coast today. Three reached that point early this morning. This, it is thought, would ease undersea raiders to desert that field, striking the next blows further south. Some officials expected to hear of new operations in the Gulf of Mexico, where there is a persistent

SURVIVORS SAY THERE WERE FIVE SUBS.

Newport, Oct. 9.—Rear Admiral Coates, commander of the destroyer fleet which went to the assistance of the vessels sunk yesterday, announced that he had obtained the names of approximately 220 persons, including thirty-three women and ten children, who had been rescued.

Destroyers are still searching for the Kingston's crew. Stories of survivors differed widely. Some declared they had seen five submarines, but undoubtedly there were two. A member of the destroyer Balch's crew, said he saw a submarine supply ship.

Sub Holds Up American Steamer.

A submarine held up the American steamer, Kansas, bound from New York for Genoa with steel for the Italian government, but on establishing her identity allowed the American to proceed. The Kansas came into Boston harbor late last night for her usual call there.

The hostile submarine is believed to be the U-53 which paid a call to Newport yesterday and disappeared at sunset. Some naval men, however, declared that at least two submarines are operating close to the American shore, though outside the three-mile limit.

The record of submarine warfare as brought to land by wireless dispatches follows:

The Strathdene, British freighter, torpedoed and sunk off Nantucket shoals lights and later removed to Newport by torpedo boat destroyers. The Strathdene left New York yesterday for Bordeaux and was attacked at 6 a. m.

The Westport, British freighter, torpedoed and sunk off Nantucket. Crew abandoned the ship in small boats after a warning shot from the submarine's gun. Officers and men were taken aboard a destroyer. The vessel was attacked at 10:45 a. m. She was bound from London for Newport News.

The Stephano British liner, plying regularly between New York, Halifax and St. Johns, N. F., torpedoed southeast of Nantucket while bound for New York, reported still afloat late last night. Passengers and crew numbering 146 were picked up by the destroyer, Balch and transferred to the destroyer, Jenkins. The attack was made at 4:29 p. m.

The Kingston British freighter, torpedoed and sunk southeast of Nantucket. Crew missing and destroyers searching for them. This vessel is not accounted for in maritime registers and may be the Kingstonian. The attack occurred at 6 p. m.

The Bloomerdljk, Dutch freighter, torpedoed and sunk south of Nantucket. Crew taken aboard a destroyer. The steamer was bound from New York to Rotterdam, having sailed Saturday night.
