HAD PENCHANT FOR MARRYING COUNTERFEITERS

WERE "SHOWERS OF THE QUEER" IN TOILS

Pittsburgh, Oct 16.—The arrest of Mrs Mary Maxwell, a negro of 1214 Poplar alley, this city, and Clarence Garland, a west Indian, in Cleveland, in connection with alleged counterfeiting on charges preferred by local federal authorities, brings to light the remarkable history of Mrs Maxwell, according to F J Ahern, chief of the local service office. Mr Ahern said yesterday that his investigations of Mrs Maxwell's record show that she had been married three times, and that each of her husbands has been a counterfeiter, and has served time in a penitentiary for that or other offenses.

"Mrs Maxwell," said Chief Ahern, "is now the wife of William Maxwell, alias George Miller, a negro, who is in the county jail awaiting trial on a charge of counterfeiting. He was arrested by the Pittsburgh police September 17, for crap shooting in the Hill district, near the old water basin. A row had started because Maxwell had tried to ring in what appears to be a badly-executed counterfeit silver dollar. It is also alleged that Maxwell threw a lot of similar counterfeit over the hill along the Grant boulevard, just before the police arrested him, and that he whispered to Garland, who was in the crowd, but who escaped, to run to the Maxwell home and tell Mrs Maxwell to destroy or hide the counterfeiting outfit and any other incriminating evidence. Mrs Maxwell and Garland then disappeared.

Says Maxwell Confessed. "They will be given preliminary hearings there before United States Commissioner F H Carleton and brought here for trial. We do not know very much about Garland, except that he is a friend of the Maxwells; that he was staying at the Maxwell home for some time prior to Maxwell's arrest, and that he notified Mrs Maxwell to hide the counterfeiting outfit. It is we learn from Maxwell, who has confessed to having made counterfeit coins. "Mrs Maxwell, according to the record we have of her, was first married to Milton Wright, a negro, who in 1907 was sentenced to the Ohio penitentiary for from five to ten years for counterfeiting. He served his time and from what Maxwell says his wife told him, Wright is dead. We believe, however, that he is alive, although we have not yet learned where he is located. Mrs Maxwell's next matrimonial venture, we learn, was with Jack Williams, alias Morris Eagle, a negro, also a counterfeiter, who served time and was killed in Cleveland, December, 1910, while attempting to rob a house.

Woman May Get Off Easy. "She was married to Maxwell in Pittsburgh in 1911. Up to the time of his being married to the woman we have been unable to learn of any

criminal acts of Maxwell, who says she taught him how to make counterfeit silver dollars. "Our record of Mrs Maxwell shows that she served 90 days in jail in Ohio, having been arrested with her second husband, Jack Williams, for counterfeiting in Cleveland. Williams served two years in the federal prison at Leavenworth for the same crime. We believe the Maxwell woman is a dangerous menace to society and her record bears out our belief. But the laws of this state are peculiar in that they make a husband largely responsible for the acts of his wife."
