Gompers Defines Montreal Action of A. F. of L.

(A. N. P. Service) WASHINGTON, D. C., July 30.—Samuel Gompers, President of the American Federation of Labor, has issued a special statement for The Associated Negro Press with reference to the recent action of the Federation at its session in Montreal, Canada.

Mr. Gompers' statement is in the nature of a reply to published assertions concerning sincerity of purpose of the Federation. He says: "Permit me to say that one of the fundamental principles of the American Federation of Labor is the organization of all wage earners irrespective of race, creed, color, sex or nationality. As a matter of fact, there are a number of unions of colored wage workers now in full affiliation to the American Federation of Labor. There are several colored organizers who are in the employ of the American Federation of Labor who are devoting their entire time to the work of organizing the men and women of their own race.

"The statement made by Mr. Mays that the American Federation of Labor has not wiped out the color line. In the American Federation of Labor the color line has never existed, any more than the color line has existed in the Constitution of the United States since the passage of the 13th, 14th and 15th amendment to the constitution." is entirely in accord with the well understood principles and policies of the A. F. of L.

W. L. Mays, of Chicago, executive head of the Railway Men's International Benevolent Association, maintains in a statement that there was no official color line to wipe out, but that the practices of various organized bodies had kept the line in the organization with a vengeance.

ANOTHER GORE BOOM-ERANG BLUFF CALLED

The following statement is made with reference to an open letter purported to be signed by one Thomas F. Chase of Bartlesville, Oklahoma, making certain derogatory

statements with reference to Scott Ferris and his political record in Congress, also claiming to have deposited money in the American National Bank at Oklahoma City to be drawn over to some charitable institution during certain conditions.

These is unknown to the American National Bank. He has no deposit there.

Thomas H. Owen, vice president of the bank and head of the bank's trust company, is Gore's campaign manager. He is using the good name and reputation of the American National Bank to give some degree of respectability to underhanded campaign methods which have already been denounced by patrons of the institution.

Upon informing an official of the institution now holding the check that we desired to submit to him evidence disproving the allegations made in the Chase letter, and to fully comply with the terms of the document, we were informed that the bank has no authority to turn over either the check or the money upon such compliance. The entire decision as to the turning over of the money rests with Jean P. Day, the depositor of the check, and the Gore manager who assumes the role of arbiter, referee, judge, lawyer and all.

While perhaps the bank itself is to be absolved from any responsibility in furthering the ends of a cheap political scheme, it is true that Thomas H. Owen, vice president of the institution, Gore manager, is using his bank connection and the good name of the institution to give color and respectability to a cheap political scheme.

THOUSANDS FLEE FROM UNRIGHTEOUS WRATH

Great Labor Exodus Will Transform Famed Fertile Southland Into a Desert Waste.

(A. N. P. Service) SHREVEPORT, La., July 30.—White people of this section are greatly concerned concerning the new Exodus of Negroes on to the North. There has never been such a severity of labor as is found here now.

VICKSBURG, Miss., July 30.—Investigations carried on by local authorities indicate that more than 10,000 Negroes from this section of the state have left for various sections of the North in the last three months. The majority of them are determined to remain.

HELENA, Ar., July 30.—Ever since the Arkansas massacre, colored people have been quietly leaving Elaine, and other sections of Arkansas, going to Chicago, Michigan, Ohio and other points in the North and East. Whites who are greatly in need of labor, are assuring the people that they will be protected if they remain, but the feeling of unrest cannot be quieted.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 30.—Thru trains passing via this city on the way to northern communities, for more than four months, have been crowded with men, women and children forming part of another Exodus to the North which is due to lynchings and a general state of unrest among the people.
