

# PULLMAN PASSENGERS ARE ROBBED

## A Lone Robber Takes Charge of Pullman Sleeper and Robs Passengers of \$65.

Kansas City, Nov. 9.—A lone robber heavily masked boarded the rear sleeper on east bound California limited Rock Island train between Slater and Glasgow, Mo., at midnight last night and robbed three passengers, and escaped in the darkness. According to local officers, Pullman robber secured about \$65. Among the men robbed was E. R. Slagle, Kansas City, assistant superintendent Pullman Co. Robber is described as tall and wearing long, black overcoat and mask. He boarded rear end of sleeper and later, when train was under headway entered the car. He encountered L. S. Searson, Pullman conductor; C. W. Roller, flagman and R. W. Wood, negro porter, all of Chicago, leveling revolver at the trio. Robber commanded them to proceed ahead of him and wake up passengers as commanded. Securing what booty he could in a hurried march thru the car. He made for the second Pullman when the porter slammed and locked the door in his face. The robber then pulled air ropes and jumped from the train, disappearing in the darkness. Officers are in pursuit.

# KATY WINS BIG SUIT IN KANSAS COURTS

## Decision Holds Railway is Owner of Hundreds of Acres in Towns and Country Along Its Tracks.

Topeka, Nov. 10.—Thousands of acres of the most valuable farm lands in Kansas, together with a large amount of land located in the towns and cities of the state, is given to the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railway by a decision handed down by the Kansas supreme court in the case of that company against one Watson.

In 1866 congress guaranteed to the Union Pacific Railway Company Branch, now the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railway, a right of way 200 feet wide from Fort Riley to the south line of the state, a distance of about 150 miles. Afterwards patents were issued to private persons for the land thru which the railroad runs without excepting the right of way.

The persons holding these patents have used the right of way as being only 100 feet wide. In some cases valuable improvements have been made by them on the outer 50 feet on each side of the right of way now fenced in, and the land has been used for years.

The railroad company finally began suit to oust them, and the court now decides in its favor.

The land affected by the decision lies in Gray, Morris, Lincoln, Coffey, Woodson, Allen, Neosho and Labette counties in one of the best parts of the state. Among the larger towns touched in these counties by the railway are White City, Council Grove, Emporia, Burlington, Chanute, Parsons, Oswego, and Chetopa.

The opinion was written by Justice Burch. The case must finally be tried in the United States supreme court, as an act of congress is involved.

The case decided today must not be confused with the suits of the Katy road against the government for land in the Indian Territory, in which Kansas is acting as trustee for the railroad. The latter suit is now in the United States supreme court.

Watson, the defendant in the present suit, is one of the many landholders on the railway right of way.

# STILL COUNTING IN KANSAS

Topeka, Nov. 8.—At eleven o'clock this morning, both Republicans and Democrats were still claiming election of their candidate for governor. Chairman Crummer, of the Republican committee claims re-election of Hoek over Harris, Democrat, by 4,000. Crummer based his claim upon returns from all counties in the state save nine, which he asserted were verified. He estimates Hoek's election by 4,129.

The nine missing counties are: Stevens, Stanton, Stafford, Ness, Morton, Norton, Meade, Hamilton and Grant. Two years ago gave Hoek a plurality of 1713.

Chairman Ryan, of the Democratic state committee, says:

"Harris is undoubtedly elected governor of Kansas by 2,000. I do not care to give my figures by counties but official returns undoubtedly show my estimate correct. We have our men watching polls over the state and do not propose to be counted out. Harris said the result is so close it will take official count to decide. He declared he believed his chances as good as Hoek's."

Topeka, Nov. 9.—David Hoek, Democratic candidate for attorney general today quoted in an interview as saying: "I believe Harris received sufficient votes to elect him, and that every possible effort is being made to count him out. I have information which I believe to be reliable that some hardy men who manipulated

Topeka Nov. 8.—Republican chairman Crummer this afternoon gave out the following statement: "Intimidation by the Democratic press Republican leaders were trying to make changes in returns is a deliberate and malicious falsehood. I have nothing to cover up. Our fight has been in the open and we have won and shall see to it that no attempt is made to steal victory from us."

# TO SERVE WITH ROAST DUCK.

# Baltimore Apple Bread a Favorite Southern Dish.

Baltimore apple bread was a favorite accomplishment in duck in the old ante-bellum days, and in many old Maryland families still finds abundant appreciation. To make it, rub through a pound of sifted and warmed bread flour, two-thirds of a cup of butter and three heaping tablespoons sugar. Dissolve half a compressed yeast cake in a cup of milk that has been scalded and cooled to lukewarm. Add to the flour and mix to a stiff batter. Add again three eggs well beaten and beat the batter until it blisters. It needs to be very stiff. Cover and let rise over night in a warm place. In the morning it should be nearly doubled in bulk. Divide in two portions and roll out in cakes about half an inch thick. Spread one with rather tart apple sauce, cover with the other and let them rise together about half an hour, then bake in a moderate oven until well done. As soon as taken from the oven spread with more well-cooked and sweetened apple sauce, dredge lightly with sugar, sprinkle with nutmeg or cinnamon, and set back in the oven long enough for the sugar to melt. Eat very hot.

# HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Serve crisp celery with cold meat. It is always appreciated, and is a fine nerve tonic.

For washing coarse clothes soft soap is best, and will go further than the hard yellow soap.

To clean your pewter, first wash it in very hot water, rub with fine silver

sand, and when quite dry polish with a leather.

Croquettes baked in the oven instead of fried, and serve with a rich brown sauce, are the invention of a housewife who was once a victim of dyspepsia.

The knife used for peeling a pineapple should not be used for slicing it, as the rind contains an acid that is apt to cause a swollen mouth and sore lips.

Instead of a table mat under the brass kerosene lamp use a shallow Remoras brass tray. For the gas or electric lamp tooled leather mats are in excellent taste.

After nailing down a carpet, and before putting in the furniture, sweep the whole surface well and then go over with a scrubbing brush slightly wetted with ammonia.

# Washing Laces.

To wash laces make a suds with naphtha soap and tepid water, put the laces in it and let them soak for half an hour; then squeeze them around and squeeze between the hands to get the water out. Make fresh suds squeeze laces around again, but do not rub lest you break the meshes; squeeze, then rinse in two waters, with a few drops of dissolved gum arabic in the last water. If the lace is cream or ecru add a few drops of orange dye to the last water, or, if pure white, a few drops of bluing. Spread on a sheet to dry; when nearly dry pull gently into shape and roll from one end, keeping edges even; then wrap in a damp cloth and let lie for half an hour and press with a hot too hot iron.

# To Make a Dull Piano Bright.

Alcohol is used by workers in factories to remove the dull appearance from highly polished surfaces of pianos, but the putting on of this liquid must be carefully done, or the finish will be burned, and the case have to be dressed and polished the same as it was when new. This process is costly, so if alcohol is rubbed on the dull spots with a soft cotton or flannel cloth only a little of the liquid should be used. Put on with a light stroke across the surface, then should follow a brisk rub with a soft silk or cheesecloth rag.
