

SPECIAL ELECTION PROCLAMATION.
(Pub. Daily Times Dec. 31, 1914, Jan. 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 1915.)
WHEREAS, on the 25th day of December, 1914, at a regular meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the City of Oklahoma City, of the State of Oklahoma, there was duly adopted by said Board a certain resolution whereby the Mayor of said City of Oklahoma City was therein authorized and directed to call a special election in said city for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said city the following proposition, to-wit:
"The proposition of issuing negotiable coupon bonds of the City of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, in the aggregate sum of Two Hundred and Forty Thousand (\$240,000.00) Dollars, for the purpose of purchasing and acquiring suitable grounds and real estate, to establish thereon a good and sufficient lake or reservoir for the purpose of procuring and providing an adequate and permanent supply of water for said city and its inhabitants, and also to connect the same with the present existing water works plant, including all machinery and supplies necessary for the proper construction of the same, to be devoted to the public use, and to be owned exclusively by the said city, and the levying and collection of an annual tax sufficient to pay the interest upon said bonds as it falls due, and also to constitute a sinking fund for the payment of the principal thereof within twenty-five (25) years from their date; said bonds to bear interest at a rate not to exceed five per centum per annum, payable semi-annually."
NOW, THEREFORE, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the constitution and laws of the State of Oklahoma, and of the charter of the City of Oklahoma City, and pursuant to said resolution, I hereby proclaim and give public notice that a special election is hereby called to be held in said City of Oklahoma City, State of Oklahoma, on the 15th day of January, 1915, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said city the following proposition, to-wit:
"Shall the City of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, incur an indebtedness by issuing negotiable coupon bonds in the aggregate amount of Two Hundred and Forty Thousand (\$240,000.00) Dollars, for the purpose of purchasing and acquiring suitable grounds and real estate, to establish thereon a good and sufficient lake or reservoir for the purpose of procuring and providing an adequate and permanent supply of water for said city and its inhabitants, and also to connect the same with the present existing water works plant, including all machinery and supplies necessary for the proper construction of the same, to be devoted to the public use and to be owned exclusively by the said city, and the levying and collection of an annual tax sufficient to pay the interest upon said bonds as it falls due, and also to constitute a sinking fund for the payment of the principal thereof within twenty-five (25) years from their date; said bonds to bear interest at a rate not to exceed five per centum per annum, payable semi-annually."
Said proposition shall be placed upon the ballots to be used at said election and will constitute the proposition and question to be voted upon at said election.
The polls shall be opened at the hour of Twelve (12) o'clock noon, of said day, and shall be closed at the hour of eight (8) o'clock, Three and Four o'clock, P. M. There shall be in said city twelve (12) polling places, at which said election shall be held, and their designation, description and the places of the precinct officers, residents of the precinct, who are hereby appointed, are, as follows, to-wit:

Shall be composed of regular voting precincts One, Two and Three, of Ward One, of said city, as established by the County Election Board of said County. The voting place thereof shall be at City Fire Station at corner of 21st Street and Western Avenue. The judges in said precinct shall be:
D. C. Patterson and H. A. Douglas. The clerks in said precinct shall be:
P. E. Heinrich and C. E. Connelley.
"SPECIAL ELECTION PRECINCT NO. TWO (2), OF WARD NO. ONE (1)"
Shall be composed of regular voting precincts Four, Five and Six, of Ward One, of said city, as established by the County Election Board of said County. The voting place thereof shall be at the corner of 21st Street and Western Avenue. The judges in said precinct shall be:
D. C. Patterson and H. A. Douglas. The clerks in said precinct shall be:
L. C. McClure and E. H. Johnston.
"SPECIAL ELECTION PRECINCT NO. THREE (3), OF WARD NO. ONE (1)"
Shall be composed of regular voting precincts Seven, Eight and Nine, of Ward One, of said city, as established by the County Election Board of said County. The voting place thereof shall be at the corner of 21st Street and Western Avenue. The judges in said precinct shall be:
