

CAMPAIGN FOR NEW MEMBERS

Credit Men Plan "House to House" Canvass to Increase Their List

A PLAN to launch a gigantic, state-wide campaign for new members was formulated following the meeting of the Credit Men's Association at the Hotel Skirvin last week. Every jobber and wholesaler in Oklahoma City, as well as all other tradesmen competent to membership, will be solicited to join the organization before the next monthly meeting by a committee especially appointed for that purpose; while in every town in the state the wholesale men of consequence will be asked to enter. It is expected that the present membership of 86 will have grown to at least 150 within a very short time.

"The dues of members are small and the advantages great," said G. M. Head, of Inlow and Head, appointed publicity agent at Thursday's meeting. "The yearly dues are nominal, while in many instances a member is able to secure information regarding the financial standing of a prospective customer that will save him many hundreds of dollars. Indeed one of our members recently saved \$800 when a customer, rated by Dun and Bradstreet as reliable, was discovered through our records to be actually in solvent."

The adjusting bureau, it was explained at Thursday's meeting will collect accounts for a nominal fee and thus save its members many hundreds of dollars annually; while the credit exchange bureau, by issuing a daily bulletin, enables its members to ascertain constantly the exact financial status of each other's customers.

FOUND WIFE WHO HAD RUN AWAY

Theater Owner Persists in Hunt For 22 Months Until His Search Is Rewarded

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Oct. 25.—After searching for his 22 months old son and wife for more than a year, during which detectives have been searching all over the country, Frank G. Cook, a motion picture theater owner of New York and Keosauqua, N. J., and the woman and the child met in the supreme court at Albion, N. Y. The mother, who claims that she was neglected, that her husband failed to support her and compelled her to live in New York in a house of questionable reputation, has been living with her sister and her child, under an assumed name in Albion.



Cook married Miss Rosemary Rauch, of Los Angeles at Chicago, on September 4, 1912. While on their honeymoon they were enticed to New York by the death of Cook's father. The son was born December 14, 1913 and the following July, when Cook returned from a business trip to Keosauqua he found the house stripped of furniture and his wife and child gone. A neighbor of Mrs. Chamberlain, as Mrs. Cook was known in Albion, recognized the child as the Cook baby from pictures printed in the Buffalo papers and communicated with Cook. Arguments will be made before Justice Taylor at Buffalo on November 1.

AIRCRAFT GUNNERY HIGHLY EFFICIENT

Germans Have Invented Guns That Will Carry With Effect and Accuracy Nearly Two Miles Straight Up

who gave his name as Robert Fay, was suspected by the police of being the director of their activities. Fay said he was a lieutenant in the German army, had won the Iron cross in the fighting in the Champagne district of France and that he came to America last April. The police asserted Fay admitted he came here to work out a plan to stop the shipment of war munitions to the allies. The other prisoner was Walter Scholz, who said he was Fay's brother-in-law and had been in this country for two years.

A large quantity of explosives including dynamite and various kinds of acid used in the making of explosives was found in their rooms in the Weehawken, or in a storage house in Hoboken.

The two men had been watched by New York detectives for two months. They were seen to pay frequent visits to an isolated spot in the woods of Grantwood, N. J., on the Palisades near Weehawken. On Saturday last, detectives hidden in a treetop, watched the scene of their activities for eleven hours.

They say they saw the two men come there late at night and test an explosive by blowing up a tree. Again yesterday the police watched in the woods and saw Fay and Scholz burning powder and testing an explosive. When the test was completed the detectives arrested them. According to the police Fay offered \$1,000 to be set free.

SEE WORLD-WIDE TRADE CAMPAIGN

Dept. of Commerce Projects a Scheme for Reaping Commercial Benefit to Utmost

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—What the department of commerce will do to capture world markets for the United States if congress approves Secretary Redfield's plan is outlined in a statement by Dr. E. E. Pratt, chief of the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce.

A trade campaign, world-wide in scope, is planned. American merchants and manufacturers are to be aided in taking advantage of present unusual opportunities in preparing for the contest for trade supremacy after the war.

Big increases in the appropriation for the bureau are to be asked as part of Secretary Redfield's general program for commercial preparedness. Features of the plan include reorganization of the staff in Washington and an increase to about twice its present size of the foreign commercial service.

DUMBA SAYS HIS TRIP WAS PLEASANT

BERLIN, Oct. 25.—Dr. C. T. Dumba, former Austro-Hungarian ambassador at Washington, who arrived here Sun-

day from the United States, Monday gave out the following interview: "The causes which necessitated my return to Vienna have been treated so fully in the press that it is unnecessary to review it. But if you ask me if the tale's are true which were spread about my trip and which reached a climax in the report that people on board the steamer avoided me, I can only reply that the opposite is true. My wife and I felt ourselves under the necessity of conducting ourselves with reserve toward our fellow travelers. It was they who approached us."

MANY CATTLE LOST

HUGA, Oct. 25.—The floods last week in the Klamath bottoms have caused the loss of many cattle. Few people were able to drive all their herds from the bottoms when the waters came and it was estimated that something like one thousand head have drowned.

TORN FROM ARMS OF HIS BELOVED

Escaped Convict Detected and Taken Back to Joliet Three Days After His Marriage to Lydia Frank

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—Leaving a bride of three days, George Oberief, an escaped convict, was returned to Joliet penitentiary Monday to remain the rest of his life. Oberief escaped from the prison honor farm July 30, obtained employment under an assumed name and fell in love with Miss Lydia Frank, who worked at an adjoining desk. They were married on Friday, the bride ignorant of the fact that her husband was an escaped prisoner sentenced for life imprisonment for the murder of a Chicago policeman fourteen years ago.
