

HOW CITY USES WATER SUPPLY

Local Physician Presents Interesting Figures - 150 Gallons, Per Capita

A BIG LOCAL ISSUE

Politics, Insincerity and All That Sort of Talk About Bond Issue Is Decried

YESTERDAY I presented a citizen's petition, asking that about a bigger water supply be made available to this city...

I wonder how many people have sought for knowledge of the subject and thereby have an intelligent opinion as to the amount of water required for a city of our magnitude...

Let us look at the proposition squarely and fairly. For nothing is a more an adult requirement, on the average, than seven pints of water daily of this amount 2.45 pints are required for the solid food that is ingested...

Water for Bathing. For bathing, the quantity varies very much, according to conditions of the individual...

For water closets, the small quantity provided in "water closets" is four to six gallons. These conveniences effect a great saving in water and meet all the requirements.

For other purposes, such as manufacturing, washing of sidewalks, sprinkling of streets, and lawns, and for hospitals, brings the daily supply up to a very large amount. The estimate of the chief of the bureau of water of Philadelphia, of 128 gallons per head for day should meet all the legitimate requirements.

The item for manufacturing purposes, in our case, required is much less and will never be greater unless an ample general supply is provided, as pointed out recently by Dr. Street, commissioner of public property. It is true, also, as stated by the same official, that the cost of water to consumers is very much less than the charges made in a great number of other cities...

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
