

Bronze Statue Gift to Guard From Ilionites

Replica of Sculptured Remington on Way to Oklahoma as Shoot Trophy.

A bronze statue of Eliphalet Remington jr., maker of the first Remington rifle and founder of the great arms company, is a trophy to be shot for by the Oklahoma National guard each year. The statue, in bronze, from the original by Albin Polasek, a Bohemian sculptor, is on the way to the adjutant general's office—a gift from the citizens of Ilion, N. Y.

Ilion with the help of many noted men is preparing to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the making of the first Remington rifle. Eliphalet Remington jr., made the gun at his father's forge in the Mohawk Valley in 1816.

Ilion Celebration. Speech-making, games and pageants and the unveiling of the Remington statue will compose a three-day program of celebration. Governor Whitman, Senator Warren G. Harding of Ohio, Major Hugh L. Scott, chief of staff of the United States army and others will speak. The Remington statue by Polasek will be unveiled.

Replicas to Guard. Replicas of this statue have been presented by the citizens of Ilion to every national guard organization in the United States. They will be trophies to be given for shooting ability on the range.

The statue for Oklahoma is expected within a few days and will be received by Adjutant General Earp on behalf of the guard. It is three feet high, of bronze, and represents Eliphalet Remington jr., standing at his forge with his first rifle in hand.

Whitgrave, the father, took the baby in his arms, rushed to an automobile and disappeared. He is reported to have boarded a train for Birmingham, Ala.

Beggar, Owner of Two Farms, Arrested, Bawls Out Court

"No, sir, I don't want a lawyer. I want a jury to tell my story to," W. L. Hunt, the blind beggar of Saturday's notoriety declared in police court this morning.

Judge Spitzer had appointed Orvel Johnson to defend the old man. Begging in the Lee-Huckins lobby and disturbance he raised when Motorcycle Officer Braun attempted to quiet him caused the old man's arrest.

Judge Is Rebuked. The police court was not conducted according to the prisoner's ideas. The judge was "bawled out." The defendant's attorney was interrupted. The policeman was told where to head in and the whole world was informed that W. L. Hunt would do as he pleased.

After declaring himself Hunt accepted the services of Attorney Johnson. He then announced that he would leave town after he had "worked" a day or two to raise a "piece of money."

Owner of Two Farms. But when Judge Spitzer was told that the old man owned two farms in Texas and could see well enough to count his money when jailed, the defendant was told to pay a \$80 fine or leave town immediately. At close of court he was still thinking about it.

Hunt reminded himself that he had been "getting by" for fifty-six years and guessed he would continue along the same line.

FRISCO PAYS FEE THEN SUES TO RECOVER IT

Certified Copy of Railroad Charter Costs Company \$12,875.83.

The Frisco Railroad company has filed with Secretary of State Lyon a certified copy of its charter and paid the state a fee of \$12,875.83 for filing of the document.

The money was paid under protest and suit has been instituted by the company in federal court to recover it. The amount paid represents a nominal fee on the amount of capital stock the company has invested in Oklahoma.
