Shall I just stop writing to her altogether or write shorter letters every time I write and quit? I am a girl of good repute and do not want to be looked down on.

Dialect in 'Dixie' Arouses Protests of New Yorkers

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—Negro dialect in songs published in public school text books is disapproved by high school officials of this city who have appointed a committee to ask music publishers to eliminate it.

"We want our children to learn pure English, not a dialect," said Dr. Frank R. Rex, the musical director. "There are many foreign children in our schools who find it hard enough to learn English and who are confused by the dialect. I think a change ought to be made throughout the country."

"In 'Dixie' it is proposed the words 'de' and 'neber' be changed to 'the' and 'never.' It is also proposed to change 'perilous fight' in the 'Star Spangled Banner' to read 'clouds of the fight'."

GOOD ROADS ACTUALLY BRING MONEY RESULTS

New York Man Tells How They Reduce Mail Order Business Largely.

"Not only will good roads aid the farmer by allowing him to market his produce within a minimum of time and expense and at a maximum profit, but they will also cut down the business of mail order houses."

This statement was made this morning by Lacklan MacLeay, secretary of the chamber of commerce of Syracuse, N. Y., who is in Oklahoma City at the invitation of the local chamber. Mr. MacLeay is one of the three prospects as successor to Elmer E. Brown, present secretary who recently resigned.

How Farmer Feels.
"A farmer who has poor roads between his land and the nearest market is deterred from not only marketing his products as frequently as he might, but also when he might desire to go to town to make purchases he finds it much easier to take down a mail order catalog, select what he wants to buy, send an order by mail and receive his goods by parcel post than to make a long, arduous trip over rutty roads."

Result in New York.
"The state of New York has spent recently \$100,000,000 on hard surfaced highways. As a result, mail order business has been decreased wonderfully. The money that once was spent outside is now kept in the communities in which it belongs. Good roads reduce the profit of the mail order house. It is no mere theory, for it has worked out in practice."

\$10,000 IS PLEDGED TO OZARK TRAIL BUILDING

Local Civic Associations Are Enthusiastic Over Road Proposition.

Ten thousand dollars was pledged last night to Col. W. H. (Cotton) Harvey, president of the Ozark Trails association by committees from local civic associations, the money to be used in promoting an extension of the Ozark trail west from Oklahoma City to Santa Fe, N. M.

This action was taken at a meeting in the Skirvin hotel attended by representatives of the Retailers' association, Rotary club, Chamber of Commerce, Automobile club and Automobile Dealers' association. Promptly after the organizations decided upon raising the money, a telegram was sent to a prominent good roads expert asking whether or not he was at liberty to come to Oklahoma City and aid in the work of promoting the trail. A publicity agent will be appointed also to see that newspapers of the state are informed of the work's progress.

Two hundred good road boosters from Oklahoma City and the three proposed routes west of here were present at a meeting at noon yesterday, from which resulted last night's session and action.

PATRONS URGED NOT TO INTERFERE IN SCHOOLS


Whiteford Tells Federated Clubs His Attitude in Educational System.

School patrons were requested to refrain from interfering in the professional side of the Oklahoma City schools when Supt. J. A. Whiteford, new head of the local educational system, addressed a meeting of the Federated Patrons' clubs yesterday afternoon in the high school auditorium. He appeared at the invitation of Mrs. R. M. Campbell, president.

Mr. Whiteford stressed the fact that teachers were not allowed and had no desire to interfere in the home life of pupils, and expressed the wish that patrons likewise would not attempt to usurp the authority of the teacher. He requested, however, that the patrons' organizations co-operate with the teachers, for only in that way could the schools be made a complete success.

In outlining his plans for playgrounds, Mr. Whiteford stated that he intended introducing folk dancing in the schools and employing a competent playgrounds supervisor in addition to purchasing a great deal of playground apparatus.
