Immense Attendance.

Many of the record-breaking crowd were at the fair for the first time and evidently intended visiting the principal buildings before time for the races. At noon all the temporary restaurants and refreshment stands were crowded.

No Disappointments.

Every race driver had made his appearance and no disappointments were encountered from this source by the throngs in the grandstand this afternoon. Klein, Mais, Milton, Hearne, Goff, Letong, Woodbury and Miss Elfrida Mais, all expert drivers, were entered for the events. Vaudeville was to be presented in front of the grandstand between races.

Kansan Winner of Grand Ribbon

Shorthorn cattle—the most popular breed of dual beef and milk strain type among Oklahoma breeders—was attracted the greatest crowd seen in the livestock pavilion this year, and there was commensurate attention among the Oklahoma breeders when the judge, Rankin C. Forbes of the Breeders' Gazette, Chicago, pinned the grand championship ribbon on "Diamond Emblem," a four-year-old, owned by Thomas J. Dawe & Son of Troy, Kan.



Small boys—and others not quite so small—are having the times of their young lives at the automobile exhibit hall. As soon as they enter the building they are greeted by attractive young ladies, who insist on pinning on coats and shirts little felt pennants which shout to the world the merits of various brands of cars.

Some of the youngsters can be seen with their coats and shirt fronts literally covered with badges, buttons and pennants, and considerable rivalry has arisen among them as to who possesses the most variegated and extensive collection.

In the exposition building, young men and women from out-of-town have developed the habit of lingering at the booths occupied by various concerns manufacturing things to eat and drink. It is safe to assume that some of the youngsters not only have their exteriors but their interiors well lined as well.

Miniature Hives of Bees Shown

Miniature hives of bees busily engaged in extracting their breakfasts, dinners and suppers from combs upon which they had previously worked, form an interesting feature of the apiculture section at the exposition building.

Several apartments are represented. Oklahoma is not especially noted as a honey producing state, but the average visitor is impressed by its possibilities in that line after thoroughly examining the displays.

Great quantities of alfalfa and clover are grown in Oklahoma, and it is from the flowers of these plants that bees extract the nectar that finally goes into the comb. Alfalfa honey is much darker in color than that produced from clover, and has an entirely different flavor.

State Educators Barred From Work for Corporations

Employees of state educational institutions are barred from accepting employment from corporations in matters relating to fixing charges for public services, or on matters relating to taxation, according to the terms of a resolution passed this morning by the state board of education.

In no event will employees be permitted to accept any kind of employment without first getting consent of the presidents of the institutions at which they are employed.

The resolution was passed on recommendation of the committee which investigated charges brought by people of Lawton and Mangum against Prof. H. V. Borell of the department of mechanical engineering at the state university. The charges were based on the fact that he had been employed by public service corporations of those two places upon matters relating to taxation and rate fixing.

Bandits Wreck Two Trains; Score Dead

LAREDO, Texas, Sept. 27.—Bandits last Saturday wrecked a northbound National Railway passenger train between Gonzales Junction and San Luis Potosi, Mex., resulting in the loss of several lives and a few minutes later a southbound train, composed of passenger and freight cars, crashed head-on into the wreckage which was set on fire by the bandits, resulting in the loss of about a score more lives, according to T. B. Hahler, British charge at Mexico City, who arrived here today.

The British naval base of Portsmouth and military establishments near the mouth of the Thames and at North Shields, Lincoln and Derby were attacked by the Zeppelins which raided England Monday night. The German admiralty announced today.

Divorce Decree Awarded—District Judge Haven today granted a divorce decree to Travis Ashbury Brucker from J. R. Brucker on the ground of abandonment.

Auto Accident Lawsuit—Albie Remmer instituted suit yesterday in district court against Agnes and Keene Burwell for \$4,000 damages. She alleges Keene Burwell drove his automobile into a car in which she was riding, damaged the machine and permanently injured her July 7 is the date of the accident.

Self, physician, who was convicted of vagrancy in municipal court a few days ago and sentenced to a fine of \$50 and given thirty days in jail, was taken to Fort Worth today by a Tarrant county deputy sheriff. Self is alleged to be wanted in Texas on a charge of performing a criminal operation.

City Offices Closed—All offices in the city hall except those of the secretary of the board of health and Commissioners Donnelly's were closed this morning. The holiday proclaimed by the mayor is in effect all day in city offices.

Humphrey to Kansas City—Corporation Commissioner Humphrey will leave tonight for Kansas City for a conference with interstate commerce officials on matters relating to the work of the Oklahoma commission.

Welch Returns—State Insurance Commissioner Welch returned this morning from St. Louis, where he has been for several days on official business.

Judge McKewen Here—Judge Tom D. McKewen of Ada, democratic congressional nominee in the Fourth district, was in Oklahoma City today visiting in some of the state departments.

Returned to City Jail—Tommy and Jack Morrison are back in the city jail again. A month ago they were arrested on a charge of vagrancy and stealing drugs from a delivery boy and sent to the county roads. They were brought back on a writ of habeas corpus and sent to the insane asylum as drug addicts. They were released as "cured" and came back to resume their occupation as taxi drivers. This morning they were jailed on charges of vagrancy.

Rumanian Soldiers Kill 400 Officers

BERLIN, Sept. 27.—Indirect reports from Konstadt, Transylvania, declare that disgruntled Rumanian soldiers set off a dynamite bomb under a train loaded with 400 Rumanian officers, only seven of whom escaped unhurt.

Following serious instances of disobedience, the officers add, the Rumanian military authorities instituted an investigating commission and ordered two noncommissioned officers and four soldiers shot the only result, however, being the refusal of an entire regiment to obey orders.

Profit on Shells Is 435 Percent

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—The E. W. Bliss company, manufacturers of shells and torpedoes, declared an extra dividend of 100 percent in cash on the common stock. This was the second 100 percent dividend this year, the other being paid on July 1.

The company last year earned \$5,520,000, the equivalent of more than 435 percent on the \$1,250,000 common stock. Since January 1, 1914, percent has been declared, including extras of 113 percent in March and June.

Banker Indicted on Murder Charge

WACO, Texas, Sept. 27.—An indictment has been returned by the McLennan county grand jury, now in session, against T. R. Watson, president of the Farmers and Merchants State bank of Teague, charging him with the murder of John S. Patterson, state commissioner of banking and insurance.

McDaniel to Have His Hearing Today

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Sept. 27.—Two legal bodies were to begin consideration today of the case of Oscar D. McDaniel, prosecuting attorney of Buchanan county, who is charged with the murder of his wife, Bart M. Lockwood, special prosecutor, announced that at the preliminary hearing he will ask that the prisoner be held to the grand jury. The grand jury also was called to convene today.

DRY WEATHER FAVORS HARVESTING GENERALLY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—Widespread dry weather with mostly mild temperatures was decidedly favorable for harvesting and other field work generally throughout the week which ended Tuesday, according to the national weather and crop bulletin today in its final weekly issue of the season.

Corn cutting, silo filling, threshing, harvesting tobacco, potato and beet digging and cranberry picking made progress. Much fall plowing and grain seeding were accomplished, but dry soil seriously hindered this work in parts of Oklahoma, Iowa, Missouri and northern Texas and in the majority of the states east of the Mississippi river.
