

FLAG WILL SHOW MEMBERS ADDED TO RED CROSS

Public to Be Informed of Campaign Progress.

The state committee in charge of the Red Cross Christmas membership drive in Oklahoma has adopted a plan for keeping the public informed as to the progress of the campaign December 17 to 24. The plan is sufficiently simple in detail to be feasible for any town and the committee expects that it will be adopted throughout the state.

On the front of the headquarters building, Main and Broadway, will be placed a large Red Cross service flag consisting of a Red Cross on a field of white within a blue border. The Red Cross, instead of being solid red, will be an outline, filled with squares each for denoting the addition of a certain proportion of the city's quota, which in the case of Oklahoma City is 20,000 members.

Workers Optimistic.
With each addition of a sufficient number of names one of the small squares will be colored solid red, so that when the city's quota is raised the Red Cross will appear in solid color. For each additional number of names equal to the number represented by a small square there will be added a small Red Cross upon the white field, so that the exact number of memberships secured will be indicated at all times.

While the city's quota is 20,000 memberships, the county's quota 25,000 and the state's 500,000, and that of the country 15,000,000, it is the confident expectation of the workers that the quota will be exceeded all along the line.

Movement Endorsed.
J. H. Gordon of McAlester, manager of the southeastern district, addressed the State Baptist association in session at McAlester, and the organization in an executive session following the regular meeting, considered the Red Cross campaign appeal and formally decided to not only endorse the movement but to support it actively both individually and collectively.

Forty-Nine Oklahomans Join Army.

Volunteers are still rushing to the recruiting stations of the army and navy in Oklahoma City, sixty-eight enlisting in the two armed branches of the United States during the last twenty-four hours. Of this number forty-nine enlisted in the army.

The army recruiting stations will not be allowed to enlist any registered men after December 15, and it is for this reason, Capt. Marcus Covell, recruiting officer in Oklahoma, believes that the large number of recruits has been obtained this month.
