At the north end of the Santa Fe station stands a trim little cottage, the new Red Cross canteen hut that has just been completed and was occupied on last Saturday. It is also the home of every soldier who passes by, and from its compact storeroom it has in the three days it has been in use supplied the wants of more than 2,000 soldiers.

This building presents to the eye a ship-shape appearance from the exterior and one is not disappointed upon entering to find that the completeness of the cottage is carried out in the furnishings. First you enter the reading room, this is furnished in wicker and the window draperies harmonize with the pillows and upholstery. Tables with writing materials are placed here for the convenience of the soldier, and here supplies are handed to hungry men in khaki. In the kitchen everything is complete, for there is a large ice box, a ten-gallon coffee urn, and rows and rows of shining cups, pitchers and other utensils needed to supply the wants of an unexpected rush hour. At one side of the kitchen is a store room and at the other a lavatory. On the shelves of the storeroom are many baskets packed with comfort kits, cigarettes and packages of matches, candy and various other comforts, waiting to be handed out.

Since the reorganization of the Red Cross canteen in March of this year, Mrs. Reuel Haskell, jr., has been in charge. She and her force of workers have been constantly engaged in making and filling comfort kits for the boys of Oklahoma who have entered the service. Every Oklahoma boy who has left for service from this city has been supplied with a home wife, and all boys who have passed through have been ministered to in numerous ways.

Many train loads of toil worn soldiers on the long trans-continental trips are cheered by a cooling cup and a supply of smokes, candy or magazines to feed the mind as well as the body. Hardly a day passes by that there is not a long troop train and there are days when so many pass that it requires the entire force of assistants to hand out sandwiches to the eager lads in khaki who are smilingly grateful for these demonstrations of interest in their behalf.

At the recent election of officers Mrs. Haskell was appointed captain of the force; Mrs. F. P. Dixon, first lieutenant; Mrs. Ed Overholser, second lieutenant, and Mrs. G. W. Carrico, mail carrier. It is the plan of the canteen force to have four women and a captain at the canteen each day. Mrs. W. B. Turner is in charge today. Wednesday the canteen served all varieties of soldiers, there were several regular men who had been in the service for many years, there were sailors recently enlisted, marines on their way to their duties, and aero men also. At the meeting of the Cleveland school home demonstration club Thursday there was a pleasant surprise for their instructor Miss Ita Ross. The boys and girls had assembled at the school house in the early morning and under the direction of their former grade teacher, Miss Marie Gray, they made booklets that covered the work of

the entire year's lessons. These were attractively covered with heavy paper illustrated backs, and the inside of the girls' booklets represented the work done in canning, pickling and preserving. The boys' booklets were equally interesting and covered the work done in farming, such as cotton culture, gardening and poultry raising. This club ranks 100 percent on reports during the entire year.
